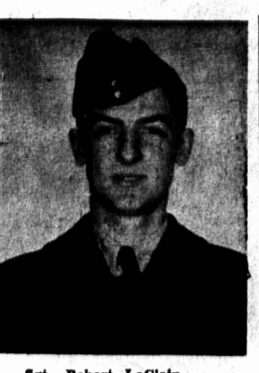

# Breakwater Tenders For Fishing Cove Being Called

OTTAWA, June 9 (Special) - Tenders are being called this week by the Public Works Department for breakwater improvements to Fishing Cove, Prince County. The project consists of widening the existing breakwater by 100 feet and leveling it across the top. A vote of \$38,500 is provided in main parliamentary estimates for the job.

Outside walls of the breakwater will be sheet piling reinforced by steel tie-rods. There will be rock fill below the breakwater deck. The repairs will make for better shelter and landing facilities and when complete there will be good anchorage for 25 fishing boats.

Value of the yearly catch, chiefly lobsters, brought in to Fishing Cove averages \$80,000.

Tenders will be opened on July 6 and an award is expected shortly afterwards. The improvements were recommended to the minister of public works by J. Watson MacNaught, Liberal MP for Prince.

# 12 Cases Heard At Alberton

There were twelve cases on the docket at the Alberton Court House yesterday, with Magistrate R. S. Hinton, Q.C., presiding.

A Tignish fisherman pleaded guilty to fishing without a license contrary to section 9 of the fishery regulations and was fined \$5 and costs. An Alberton fisherman was fined \$13 and costs for retaining 13 lobsters measuring less than 2 1/2 inches carapace measurement contrary to section 10 of the fishery regulations.

A resident of Tignish, charged under section 29 of the Temperance Act with unlawfully having in his possession a quantity of liquor (moonshine testing 43.6 per cent alcohol) not purchased from a vendor, pleaded guilty and was fined \$25 and costs.

Charged under the Criminal Code with creating a disturbance in a public place, a party from Tignish was fined \$10 and costs. A person from Tignish charged with possession of liquor not purchased from a vendor was convicted and fined \$25 and costs.

For being intoxicated in a public place a resident of Tignish was fined \$20 and costs.

A party from St. Anthony's received a fine of \$20 and costs or one month for having intoxicating liquor in a place other than his residence.

A person from Tignish pleaded guilty to possession of liquor not purchased from a vendor and was fined \$25 and costs. The liquor consisted of five pints of moonshine testing 42.3 per cent. The same person was fined \$5 and costs under the Highway Traffic Act for operating a vehicle not carrying 1955 license plates.

A man from St. Edward's was fined \$100 and costs for driving a vehicle while impaired. A party from the St. Louis area was convicted under the Temperance Act with having liquor not purchased from a vendor and was fined \$25 and costs.

A resident of Plussville was fined \$20 and costs for having liquor in a place other than a residence where he resided.
