Most Pros Disappointed

AUGUSTA, Ga. (AP) — Most tournament professionals were surprised and disappointed Tuesday at news that the world's richest golf event, George S. May's \$205,000 circus at Tam O'Shanter, is being abandoned.

May said he plans to drop the tournament, effective this year, in a dispute with the Professional Golfers Association over distribution of players' entrance fees.

"Frankly I was surprised," said Dow Finsterwald, a PGA committee member. "I thought the whole thing had been worked out to a point that would make the tournament an invitation affair and would not ask entrance fees."

Reaction varied, although virtually all players agreed it was a blow to lose a tournament with so much cash for prize money. Some blamed the action on the tightening business recession. Others said the PGA demands on May probably were too severe.

The tournament committee has asked sponsors to return the entrance fees to help finance operations of the tournament schedule. Most sponsors are co-operating.

Lou Fontinato Is Fined

BOSTON (AP)—Lou Fontinato, New York Ranger defenceman, was fined \$25 Tuesday on a charge of assault and battery on a fan during a National Hockey League game in Boston Garden Monday.

Fontinato was charged with striking a fan in the stands. The fan was injured and taken to the hospital. Fontinato was suspended for the next game.

Fontinato's lawyer said he would appeal the fine. The Rangers' manager said he would also appeal the suspension.

Fontinato is a star player for the Rangers. He has scored 15 goals and 25 assists in 45 games this season.

Fontinato was born in Italy and came to Canada as a child. He played hockey for several years before joining the Rangers.

Fontinato is expected to return to the Rangers after his suspension. He is a popular player with the fans.

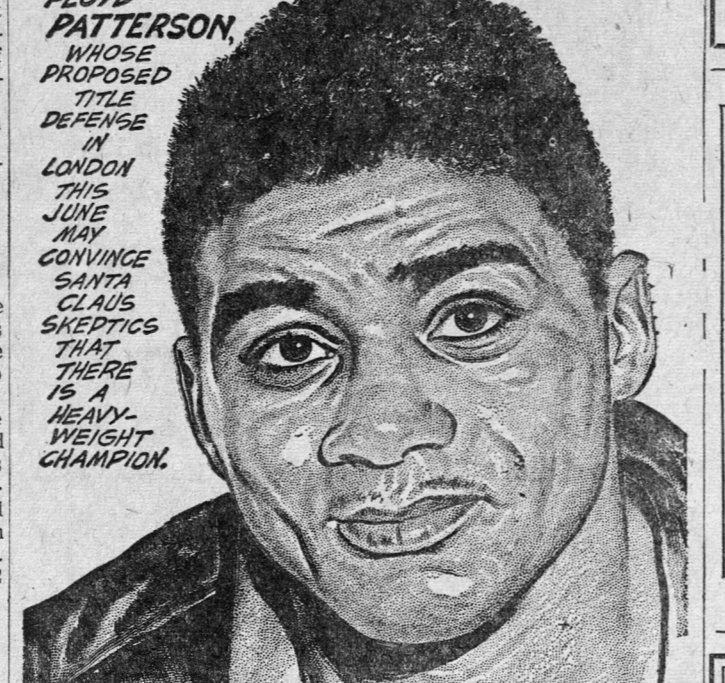
