

HOUSEHOLD HINTS.

Coffee Cake.—Take 2 cups sugar, 1 cup butter, 4 eggs, 4 level cups flour, 1 teaspoonful cloves, and fruit if you wish.

Dressing for Lettuce Salad for One.—The yolk of 1 egg, 1 tablespoonful of oil, 1 teaspoonful of pulverized sugar, the half of a lemon.

White Cake.—One cup butter, two cups sugar, three cups flour, white of five eggs, one teaspoonful soda, two teaspoonfuls cream of tartar, one cup milk.

Plain Cake.—Take a cup of butter, 1 cup of sugar, 1 cup of molasses, 1 cup sour milk, 3 cups flour, 4 eggs, 1 cup of raisins, 1 teaspoonful of cinnamon, 1 teaspoonful soda; add flour, to make a little stiffer than pound cake; steam 3 hours. To be served with wine sauce.

Quick Loaf Cake.—Take 1 pound flour, three-quarter pound of sugar, half pound butter, 1 wine glass sherry, 1 teacup sweet milk, 1 cup of raisins, 3 eggs, nutmeg, and a pinch of mace. Stir the butter and sugar to a cream, add eggs, drop in 1 at a time, nutmeg and mace then the wine and milk, and the flour last, with two teaspoonfuls of baking-powder in it.

Brioche.—This is an excellent light cake for breakfast or luncheon, and is much used in France. Beat 1/2 pound of butter until it is in a cream take 3 eggs and beat until light; mix thoroughly with the butter; add to this half pound of sifted flour, and to this mix 1 small cake compressed yeast; then a gill of water; set to rise over night in a warm place; put in a turban form, and bake in a quick oven.

Chocolate Pudding.—Mix the yolks of 6 eggs with one cup and a half of sugar and 15 tablespoonfuls of bread crumbs, then a quart of boiled milk; take 8 tablespoonfuls of grated chocolate, mix with a little boiling water, and pour into the mixture; the whites of 3 eggs are to be well beaten and added last, with a very little salt; bake one hour; beat the remaining whites into a stiff froth; add icing sugar sufficient to make a meringue, and dry without browning.

Potato Flour.—Rasp the potatoes into a tub of cold water and change it repeatedly until the raspings fall to the bottom like paste; then dry it in the air, pound it in a mortar, and pass it through a hair sieve. It is nearly as nutritive and much lighter than wheat-flour. It is, therefore, preferable for making puddings and pastry for infants and invalids. A portion of it also improves the appearance of household bread, and dealers often pass it off as arrowroot. If kept dry, it will remain good for years.

Latest News Notes.

The Book of Common Prayer has been translated into more than 60 languages, and 1,000,000 copies of it are printed every year.

The Southern Presbyterian Church has a Presbytery among the Indians, with 24 organized churches and over 1,000 communicants.

The German population in Philadelphia is estimated at about 130,000. To meet the spiritual wants of these, there are 44 Evangelical German churches.

The Friends of Great Britain expend \$40,000 on missions in Madagascar, Syria and India. They have two congregations in Palestine of about 500 hearers.

The Presbyterian Church in England has 10 Presbyteries, 249 ministers, and 54,259 communicants. The receipts for all purposes the past year were \$900,000.

HEAVY SHEEP.—Last week Mr. Goodfellow, Whithorn, slaughtered a fine Cheviot one year-old belonging to Mr. M. D. Stewart of Tendergib, which weighed when killed 113 lbs.

A yearling filly, bred by Mr. John Gibson, Summerfield, Ruthwell, Eng., was sold to Mr. Simon Beattie, Prestonhall, for the sum of 100 guineas, to be shipped to America.

The *Aurora*, of Rome, the Pope's organ, publishes the rules for the establishment of the new academy to inculcate the philosophy of St. Thomas Aquinas. One of the purposes of the academy is to train persons to teach the philosophy.
