

# Halifax Wanderers Win Track And Field Meet

A crack six-man track squad of Halifax Wanderers, led by two young college students, captured top team honors and a seasoned Charlotte-town campaigner won the highest number of individual points in the Maritime Invitation Track and Field Meet at Memorial Field yesterday afternoon.

The Wanderers with runners Bill Haley and Johnny Martin showing the way amassed an impressive total of 59 points. Second place honors were won by the Halifax Navy team with 38 points followed by the Abbies with 24 and the R.C.A.F., Summerside, with 14.

George Walters of Charlotte-town picked up two firsts and two seconds in the field events to score a total of 16 points. Walters aggregated one point more than the Wanderers Bill Haley who had 15 points on three first placings.

Although they picked up nearly half the Wanderers points, Haley and Martin were not the whole show in the Halifax team's win. Max Keeping, J. Warner, Stewart MacMillan and Best all added points to further the Haligonians' cause.

Working under a hot sun with a fair sized crowd of fans looking on the athletes from the four teams staged one of the finest track meets to be witnessed here in recent years. The meet got underway at 2:30 and under the capable guidance of Brigadier Bill Reid was completed before six o'clock.

Approximately 55 athletes, including the best in Maritime Inter-collegiate circles and the Services took part in the competition. The Halifax Navy with about 25 men had the most entries. The Abbies and the R. C. A. F. each had a dozen men in the meet.

The capable Bill Haley swept all honors in the dashes. Haley placed first in the 100, 220 and 440 yard events and in addition helped Wanderers pick up 10 points in the relay.

A Saint Mary's College student Johnny Martin wrapped up the distance running honors for the Wanderers. Martin easily won the half mile and the mile runs. Stewart MacMillan of the Wanderers who placed second in the mile later won the six mile road race.

As expected George Walters and Wendall Barrett stood out for the Abbies. Walters won first placings in the javelin and the hammer throws. George placed second in the discus throw and the 16 lb. shot putt.

20-year-old Wendall Barrett took the top honors in the running broad jump with a leap of 20 feet, nine inches. Barrett placed second in the hop, step and jump event to contribute a total of eight points to the Abbies cause.

McGill University's Don Walsh, a member of the Reserve Navy stationed at Halifax scored 10

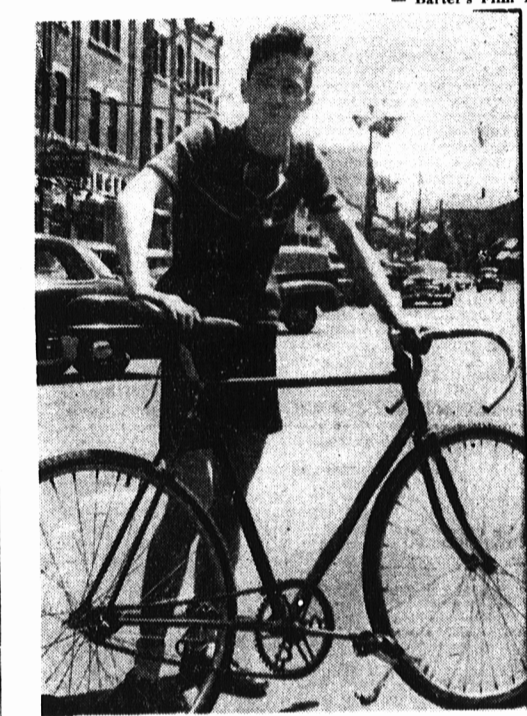

## Lloyd Larter Winner Of 30-Mile Bicycle Race

A well conditioned Lloyd Larter, 20-year-old Charlottetown boy, won the gruelling 30 mile bicycle race from Kensington to Charlottetown yesterday morning in the fast time of one hour, 39 minutes and 47 seconds.

Larter beat out a field of seven competitors in pedalling his way over the rough and hilly roads under a hot sun. His closest competitor was Ron Wilkinson of the Royal Air Force, Summerside.

Larter and Wilkinson exchanged the lead dozens of times between Kensington and Winsloe. About six miles from the City Larter took the lead and spurred away to finish well in front.

The victory was Larter's second in the past three years. In 1949 he won the 10 mile bicycle race here and the following summer he placed second in the 20 mile distance. He did not enter last year's race.

Placing a close third yesterday morning was young Jimmy Fardy of Charlottetown. Fardy started slowly and trailed the pack at Fredericton. At Fredericton he started to put on the pressure and at one point led the pack. He covered the distance in one hour and 45 minutes and 37 seconds.

Wilkinson's time was one hour, 44 minutes and 55 seconds or 42 seconds less than Fardy's. Both Wilkinson and Fardy were working on borrowed bicycles.

Young Jimmy Walker of Charlottetown finished fourth in the time of one hour, 49 minutes and 20 seconds. John Locke, R. C. N., Halifax was fifth, Ed Moore,

## Large Crowd Sees Keen Horse Racing At S'side Track

The Dominion Day races at Summerside were run off before a very large crowd of racing fans. The weather was ideal, and many close finishes were in evidence.

No. 2 classified, first heat—Cochato Princess led to the quarter-pole and was overtaken by Lily Marlene in the half. The dark red mare was never headed, although threatened in the stretch by Alan Mac and Winnie's Last.

Second heat—Again Lily Marlene led all the way to the stretch but Alan Mac, black horse driven by Sobey, in a hard drive in the home stretch beat the Warren mare by a half-length.

Third heat—Winnie's Last led the field to the three-quarter pole but Harold Stead, pulling the Playdale horse out, went round the field, winning by two lengths. All three heat winners in this class set new records.

No. 3 classified, first heat—Baglole took Simcoe Peter to the front at the first turn and led all the way to the wire. Mary's Delight then took the lead, and showed too much speed, finishing a length in front of Anne's Dream.

Second heat—Propane went out in front in this heat, and held the pole to the three-quarter mark. Mary's Delight and Anne's Dream challenged and one of the most thrilling stretch drives of the day took place with the bay mare driven by Moreside showed in front under the wire.

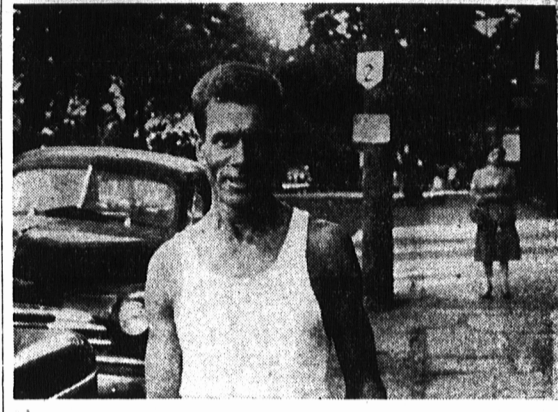
Third heat—Propane again led to the three-quarter pole, but died fast on the last turn and Anne's Dream outfooted the field in this heat, winning by two lengths over Anyway, and setting a new record of 2:15 4-5.

No. 1 classified—Miss Donna Mae took command from the start of the first heat and was never headed, although Jennie Kalmuck coming very fast in the stretch made it a thrilling finish to lose out to the mare from the Letcher stables by a head.

Second heat—Miss Donna Mae again took the lead holding it to the home stretch, but this time Jennie Kalmuck's blazing drive to the wire could not be denied and she finished the heat in free-for-all time (2:12) as the two entries from the Letcher stables finished 1-2.

Third heat—Babe Britton got off to a good start in this heat and led on strong again and finished two lengths ahead of George Thompson's mare.

## Halifax Man Wins 6-Mile Road Race

A 29-year-old Canadian National Express worker from Halifax, N. S., and well known middle distance runner, Stewart MacMillan won the six-mile road race from Winsloe to Charlottetown yesterday evening in the record breaking time for the course of 31 minutes and 22 seconds.

The veteran track man, running one of the best races of his 10-year career, led from the start and was never pressed. He hit the finishing tape on Market Square after exhibiting a brilliant stretch run.

MacMillan's showing was made all the more impressive in view of the fact that he competed in the mile run at the Memorial Field track meet yesterday afternoon and finished second in the event. His six-mile time of 31 minutes and 22 seconds is approximately one minute under that of the official Maritime record for the same distance. The Maritime record is held by Roy Appleton of Gloucester, Nova Scotia. MacMillan's time will not go into the record books as the race was not held on a track.

Another railway worker, Joe Richard of Saint John, New Brunswick, finished second. The 37-year-old Richard, who is employed by the C. P. R., covered the distance in 34 minutes and seven seconds.

Russell "Housey" Doyle of Charlottetown, who won the race last year in 36 minutes and 47 seconds placed third yesterday evening. Although he finished third Doyle knocked 12 seconds off his 1951 mark.

A Halifax Navy man, Norman Naplin finished fourth in the time of 38 minutes and 22 seconds. The veteran runner John Paul crossed the finish line and then collapsed to finish fifth while George Veo of Charlottetown placed sixth.
