CONTEND FOR REDUCED RATES OF RAILWAY TRAVEL.

Mr. Blair Promises Consideration of the Matter.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

OTTAWA, July 14.—In the House of Commons yesterday the Railways and Canals estimates were resumed. Messrs Martin and McDonald offered some criticism of the alleged straightening of the P. E. Island Railway. The two opposition members from the Island urged upon the government the propriety of reducing passenger rates on the railway. They pointed out that the road was so crooked as to greatly increase its length and thus increase the cost of travel. Besides the road cost only one-third as much per mile as the Intercolonial and the Government should afford cheaper transportation for the same distance.

Mr. Blair said that he was a good deal impressed by the considerations presented, some of which were new to him. He would give these views careful consideration. If he should decide to try the experiment of lower passenger rates on this railway and if it should be unprofitable he would expect that Messrs McDonald and Martin would support his course if it should be condemned by others. They said that they would do so.

HEIR TO RUSSIAN THRONE.

Czar Nicholas Issues a Manifesto Proclaiming Grand Duke Michael.

ST. PETERSBURG, July 13.—The Official Messenger publishes an Imperial manifesto worded as follows:

"Our beloved brother and heir to the throne, Grand Duke George Alexandrovitch, died at Abbas Tuman, Jan. 28, (old style). The illness which attacked him might, it was hoped, yield to the treatment initiated and the influence of the Southern climate. But God willed otherwise. In submitting without a murmur to the decree of Providence, we call all our faithful subjects to share our deep sorrow with us and to offer fervent prayers for the repose of the soul of our departed brother.

"Henceforth, and so long as it may not please God to bless us with a son, the right of succession to the throne devolves, according to the precise definition of the law of succession, upon our beloved brother, the Grand Duke Michael Alexandrovitch.

Bad Meat For Soldiers.

LONDON, July 13.—The Secretary of the Admiralty, Mr. W. E. Ellison Macartney, replying in the House of Commons to a question of Mr. James Christopher Flynn, Irish Nationalist, asked regarding the recent destruction at Deptford of 36,000 of salt meat which was unfit for food, and whether, in view of this enormous loss, the Admiralty would consider the advisability of contracting for salt meat with Irish and other home curers, said the whole of the pork destroyed at Deptford was Irish pork, and that all the beef condemned was American beef. He added that all the salt beef consumed in the British navy was obtained until recently from America which was the only available commercial source of supply. But, he continued, 60,000 pounds of beef are now cured annually at Deptford.

Crops Destroyed.

CHATHAM, Ont, July 12.—A severe hail-storm passed north of this city over Chatham township yesterday afternoon. About six inches of hail fell there, doing untold damages to crops and fruit. Some of the stones were as large as apples. All the barley and fall wheat that had not been out was literally threshed out. The orchards also suffered, and the trees in the track of the storm were stripped of their fruit. The loss cannot be estimated just now, but the great majority of the farmers will lose their entire crop, and many will be ruined the terrible storm. Some heads of wheat and barley were brought to this city, and they are empty of grain, being crushed worse than if shed with a flail.

Alaskan Boundary.

LONDON, July 12.—The American Embassy has by no means abandoned its feeling of hopefulness that the Alaskan boundary question will be satisfactorily settled. An officer of the Colonial Office said to a representative of The Mail and Empire to day: "There is no reason why the present difficulty should not be overcome with the friendly feeling existing between the two countries. We fully believe that a modus vivendi will be arranged." The present hitch, which was entirely unforeseen when the Dalton's Trail and Klekwan village boundaries were settled; relates to a few miles of territory extending westward, commencing at the junction of the Chilkoot and Klennem rivers. The boundary northward theyeto has been arranged, but the settlement of the boundary southward therefrom is still pending.

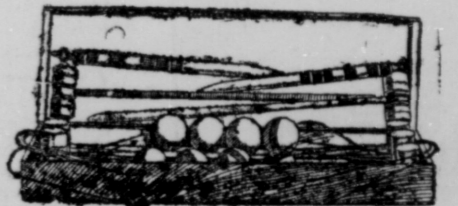
