JAPAN WILL PROTEST.

Proposal to Brand Seals by Americans Will Affect an Interest of the Mikado's Empire.

(Special to the Montreal Star.)

VANCOUVER, July 9.—The American lessees of the Pribilof sealing islands are taking steps that will, if they prove successful, annihilate the profits of the British Columbia pelagic sealing, already diminished by restrictive regulations. These steps will quite likely result in international complications between the United States and Japan, or, at least, rouse Japanese resentment. Dr. David S. Jordan, of Leland Stanford University, California, has sailed for the Island, where he and his assistants, duly commissioned by the lessees, will brand all the young female seals they can catch, and thus reduce from \$10 to \$1 the value of each of their skins, if taken by pelagic sealers. The party will also drive the male seals into a pond, enclosed by a barb wire fence and there retain them after the breeding season.

Dr. Jordan declares that he will thus drive the "poachers," by whom he means the British Columbia sealers in Behring Sea, into bankruptcy. As Alaskan Island seals, lately experimentally branded, were caught by the San Francisco sealer, St. Lawrence, in the Sea of Japan, it is evident that the Pribilof seals migrate over thousands of miles of ocean and are not only caught in Behring Sea, but also in Japanese waters.

And as the Japanese Government has lately subsidized sealing heavily, with a view to develop an advancing fishery industry of the country, it is likely enough that Japan will resent the measure intended, which leads towards annihilation of sealing on the Pacific. The Japan protest will be in addition to one in respect of hostile American tariff legislation, which will cut into the tea trade of Japan with the States. The sealing protest will not lose any vigor under these circumstances.

PROVINCIAL OPINION.

The Halifax Herald says:

"The wide difference between the professions of the Grit party when seeking power and the practice of that party when exercising power, has been one of the notable and scandalous features of Canadian public life throughout the history of that party. What they have done in violation of their preaching and pledges has long been known in all the provinces; what they are now doing in the same direction in the Dominion is being learned from day to day. It need not be a question which could run the political rakes course the more rapidly—Premier Fielding, of Nova Scotia, or Premier Peters, of P. E. Island. Premier Fielding felt that he had brought affairs to such a pass that if he wanted to save himself from defeat he had better get out of provincial politics; but the development of our coal mines under the stimulus of the national policy saved the province from bankruptcy. Premier Peters not having a province of such resources to work with, had no course to meet the demands of his pledge-breaking, spend thrift policy but to lay on palpably direct taxes and to plan a raid on the federal treasury. An election campaign is now proceeding on the island, and the record of the Peters government and party is being shown up, the showing being much the same as that of every Grit government that ever has been, is, or probably ever will be. The Peters government could no more be returned to power on its record than could the local government of Nova Scotia; but the Peters crowd hope to be sustained on the assumption that it will be for the advantage of the island to keep that party in power while the Laurierites hold the treasury keys at Ottawa. This is a "business is business" period in Canadian politics."
