P. E. I. Railway Rates.

Four years ago, in Parliament, Dr. Munn submitted a motion with the view of inducing the government to lower the rates charged on our Island railway.

We are not prepared to go the length proposed by some, who are of opinion that the entire tariff on all railways needs readjusting.

Nor have we any intention of discussing the general and somewhat complicated question of railway tariff.

Then as to passenger fares, instead of charging three cents, the fares should be reduced to two cents a mile for first-class fares.
