One Part Of Feed Policy Meets Maritime Protest

has recommended the setting up of an eastern feed grain agency. Such an agency would not market grain, but would administer feed freight assistance, study grain producers, advise the government and consult with its own producer adviser. GRAIN AND STRIKES
Generally the farmer may not be by nature the best judge of the merits or otherwise of labor disputes and strikes. He is inclined to feel that work is an important part of his existence and tends to look for reasons to do more rather than to do less. The present dispute involving port handling facilities has a direct connection with agriculture, should the strike materialize then Canada's grain movement will be seriously affected and all sections of the economy will feel the impact. The Canadian Federation of Agriculture has expressed the opinion that holding up of this grain movement would be intolerable and should not be allowed to occur if at all possible to prevent it.

CREDIT AND TAXATION
The Canadian Federation of Agriculture office based on the recommendations of its member bodies is working on briefs to be presented on two matters of importance. First is a submission to the government on farm credit. This submission will deal with farm credit services as now available, with the requirements of agriculture

of Agriculture welcomes this announcement. It has mentioned on the ability of such a Board to do a complete job when a complete job is legislative authority. The Ontario federation has recommended the need for consideration and action on the following points:

1. Adequate research in to more types of farm equipment.
2. Rigorous field testing in Ontario conditions before sale in the province.
3. Minimum full warranty of one year on all machines.
4. Standardization of parts so that they would be interchangeable from machine to machine.
5. Opening of central parts depots so that items are available on Saturdays and holidays.
6. That replacement parts be made available for a minimum period of ten years.
7. That dealers be required to prove the suitability of a machine by providing an adequate demonstration on the farmer's land.

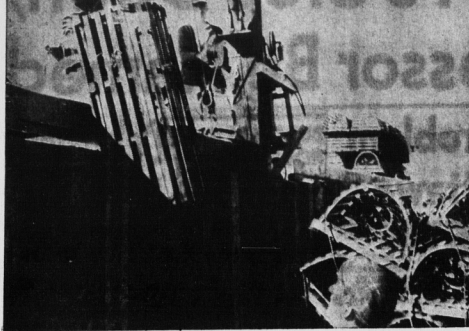

Lobster Season Said Worst In Years By S'ide Fishermen

"This has been the worst I can remember since I came to Summerside in 1940," Fred Arsenault, manager of Arsenault and Desjardins Ltd., fish distributors, said yesterday "when asked how south shore lobster fishermen had fared this year."

"The weight of lobsters we took in this year amounts to about 30 per cent of the catch in other years," he said. "Last year it picked up toward the end of the season but this year there was no pick up. This didn't improve all the way along."

The two-month season for fishermen from Victoria to North Cape closed yesterday.

"Evermore's catches have been down from last season," said one fisherman. "My partner and I came in with a little better than half the catch we had last year."

The situation was generally considered to be the same by all of the two dozen fishermen who had been out for the past few weeks. All reports indicated that this season had been the worst for all of the crews working out of Summerside in recent years.

HALIFAX (CP) - The weather office says late Thursday evening skies were clear over all three Maritime provinces and in the north the temperature at all had already dropped to 33 degrees. Temperatures in the mid-20s are forecast for most inland localities in Nova Scotia and in the mid or low 30s in New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island.

Much warmer air pushing in from the southwest will bring temperatures back to normal or slightly above normal in all three provinces today. The warmer air is relatively dry and as a result all the district except Northern New Brunswick is expected to have mainly sunny skies. Cloud ahead of the warmer air pushing in from the northwest will cover northern New Brunswick by late this afternoon.
