Indian River Man Receives Fatal Burns When Dwelling Destroyed

—George Hunter, 87, of Indian River died in Prince County Hospital about 8 a.m. yesterday morning from extensive burns received in a fire that completely destroyed his home about 4 p.m. the previous afternoon.
