RALPH MYLES IS NOW EXPECTED TO RECOVER

HALIFAX, June 8—Ralph Myles the young soldier who was found apparently mortally wounded beside the dead body of his sweet heart, Florence Miles, here on Friday last, was able to sit up and take nourishment at the Victoria General Hospital, and his recovery is anticipated.

Myles faces on his recovery two arrest warrants. One charges him with procuring and counselling Florence Miles to commit suicide for which offence a maximum penalty of life imprisonment is provided. The second charges him with attempted suicide, which, if proved, would make him liable to two years imprisonment.

Medical examiner W. D. Finn filed a report today on the death of Florence Miles, in which he called for an enquiry before a city magistrate into the facts of the case. He found that death was due to a bullet wound or whether or not as the result of suicide, he was unable to determine. Myles has stated that the double shooting followed a suicide pact and has maintained that he does not wish to live.

APPLES TO SUIT BRITISH CONSUMER

TORONTO, June 8.—Interesting and valuable experiments with English varieties of apples are being made at the Dominion Experiment Station at Kentville, N. S. As a large proportion of the Nova Scotia crop crosses the sea, it is, of course, important that varieties should be grown that best suit the British consumer. As a matter of fact, some of the best apples cultivated in the Annapolis Valley are of British and European origin, such as the Blenheim, Ribstone and Gravastains, all well known in the British Isles. Out of the large collection of varieties at Kentville it is hoped a few others may prove to be well adapted to the Maritime Provinces. Some samples shown at a meeting of the American Pomological Society in Columbus, Ohio attracted much favorable attention. An outstanding feature of the test at Kentville with orchard fertilizers is that nitrate of soda should be used with care, as otherwise there is danger of the trees growing too late in the season and being winter-killed.

U. S. GOVERNMENT WILL RECEIVE FRENCH MISSION

WASHINGTON, June 7.—The French government has been informed that the United States government will receive a special mission of French financial experts to discuss that nation's war debt, it was stated today after the second meeting of the allied debt funding commission. No definite date for the discussions has been set.

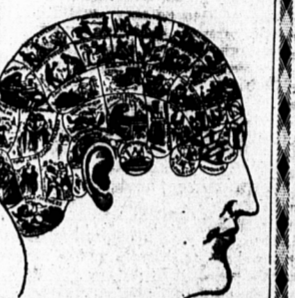

SHRINERS AND ROTARIANS FROM UNITED STATES VISIT CANADA

TORONTO, June 7.—It was announced recently at headquarters of the Passenger Traffic Department of the Canadian National Railways, Toronto, that two important bodies of Shriners and Rotarians from the United States would visit Canada travelling by the Canadian National during the month of June.

The Mecca Temple Pilgrimage to the 48th Annual Council Session, A.A.O.N.M.S., which is to be held in San Francisco the week of June 21st.

At the conclusion of the Session the itinerary is by train to Seattle where the Canadian National Steamship the "Prince Rupert" will be taken June 22nd for the 800 mile haul through the famous inside passage of the North Pacific Coast, visiting Victoria, Vancouver and Prince Rupert en route. From Prince Rupert the trip will be continued East over the lines of the Canadian National Railways through Mount Robson and Jasper Parks, stop over being made at Jasper Park Lodge, the new mountain resort to be opened June 15th by the Canadian National and to give party an opportunity of a glimpse at some of the wonder features of Canada's largest National Park. On the journey through the prairie provinces stops are made at Edmonton and Winnipeg East from Winnipeg the route is via Port Arthur to Ottawa and Montreal, stop over being made at the two latter places.

The Third District, New York Rotary Club at the conclusion of the International Association of Rotary Clubs being held in Los Angeles, Cal., June 5th to 9th will make their return trip by the same route through Canada by the Canadian National Railways, leaving Seattle for the Steamship trip up the coast on June 18th, making stop over at all important points en route as far as Ottawa, reaching that city on Tuesday, June 27th. The fact that these important bodies of business men from the United States are making these trips through Canada is a splendid recognition of the attractiveness of Canada for the tourist and the Canadian National route through Canada.

Bye-Laws

TOWN OF ALBERTON

At a meeting of the Town Council of the Town of Alberton on April 22, 1922, the Provincial Automobile Act was adopted in toto, in addition to the following bye-law:

No person shall park an auto or motor vehicle on the Main Street of the town between Church street and Poplar street, except and unless the left side of the auto or motor vehicle shall be next to and close to the curbing of the street.

Breach of this bye-law shall be punished by a fine of not more than five dollars, together with the costs of securing conviction for the first offence, and ten dollars for each subsequent conviction.
