

# 'Digger' MacEwen Wins Unanimous 10-Round Decision Over Peterson

Hard hitting "Digger" MacEwen of Westville, Nova Scotia withstood a furious tenth round assault to win an unanimous ten round decision over George "Big-Boy" Peterson of Charlottetown in an exhibition fight at the Forum last night.

MacEwen, the Westville Chief of Police and a middleweight weighing 165 pounds, piled up a big lead in the middle and late rounds as he scored repeatedly with left jabs on his heavier and slower opponent.

The Nova Scotia fighter had the Charlottetown boxer ready for the knock-out punch in the ninth He knocked Peterson down for an eight count in the latter's corner after a furious two-fisted attack but failed to follow up when Peterson regained his feet.

But in the tenth round the tables were turned, as Peterson, sensing that he needed a knockout, turned on the steam. He caught MacEwen on the shoulder with a right haymaker that drove the latter through the ropes for a three count. The two gauched and slugged it out for the rest of the round.

The semi-final bout between "Big" Lund of Charlottetown and Jackie Hayden of New Glasgow ended in a draw. Both boys fought at a hard, clean clip throughout the six rounds in the crowd pleasing feature. There were no knock-outs.

"Wrecker" Rix of Charlottetown with a height and weight advantage and a good left jab had a much for young Tiger Stevie in a four round preliminary. Joey Longaphie defeated Joey Arsenault in a four round curtain raiser.

MacEwen kept on the move throughout the ten round fight with Peterson. Most of the time he circled his bigger opponent flicking out a left jab and then following up with a right.

Peterson did most of his damage along the ropes or in the corners. Several times he trapped MacEwen in a corner but the evasive Ponce Chief tied up Peterson before too much damage could be done.

The local fighter, possibly fighting at the heaviest weight of his career, carried the fight to the Nova Scotian for the first two rounds. In that time there were few good punches landed.

In the third round Peterson caught MacEwen along the ropes and shoved him out of the ring onto the floor. From then until the tenth MacEwen carried the fight to Peterson.

The tenth round was one of the wildest witnessed in a local ring for some time. Referee Danny MacCormack had to separate the fighters continually and several times was struck by one or the other of the boxers.

The "Bud" Lund-Jackie Hayden fight went the six round distance without either fighter being knocked down. Hayden had Lund's nose bleeding throughout most of the fight as the result of a punch in the second round.

There was little to pick between the two fighters. The boys featured furious attacks of in-fighting that kept referee Harry Poulton busy breaking them up.

Goodfellow played with Detroit from 1928 to 1943 and coached St. Louis Flyers of the American Hockey League for three years before joining Black Hawks.

## Kid Gavilan Retains Title In Eleventh Round TKO Over Gil Turner

PHILADELPHIA, July 7—(AP)—Cuban Kid Gavilan stood off the buzzsaw attacks of 21-year-old Gil Turner tonight to stage a blazing rally that left his youthful challenger helpless on the ropes, a technical knockout victor in 2:47 of the 11th round, and saved his world welterweight boxing title.

Slowing down the machine-gun attack of the previously unbeaten young Philadelphia boy who had won 31 straight, the sleek Cuban kept Gavilan on the ropes with his two-fisted attack in a steaming finish that thrilled the huge crowd at Municipal Stadium.

Swarming with the fury of a champion, Gavilan hammered Turner around the ring in the savage 11th-round assault. A left hook started it and at least 50 punches kept him going.

Refusing to go down, young Turner weaved and rocked with his back against the ropes while Gavilan poured it on. Gil almost sat down on the bottom strands as the fire of youth played out.

Retreating across the ring while Gavilan pressed for the knockout, Turner's legs wobbled and caved in while Gavilan drove home his rocking rights.

Weaving in helpless fashion, Turner again backed to the ropes while the champion continued to pour home punishment. Turner was saved from possible serious injury when referee Pete Tomasco intervened at 2:47 of the 11th.

For five rounds Turner fought with a fury that brought the big crowd roaring to its feet. Gavilan gave ground willingly but fought back in spurts, matching punch for punch in stirring rallies that closed the first, third, fifth, sixth, eighth and 10th rounds.

It was a close battle up to the sudden ending. But you could see it coming as young Gil, who never went back in rounds, suddenly found his own pace and Gavilan's sharp counter punches wearing him down.

Both judges, Charlie Daggert and Lou Tress, had the bout even at 5-5 going into the 11th. Referee Tomasco had Gavilan on top 6-4. The AP card showed Gavilan ahead 5-4-1.

The tide turned in the fifth round when Gavilan drove home a driving bolt right to Turner's jaw. Two left hooks wobbled Gil

So the game was duly adjudged a win by the Aces. The Cubs' management claims that the umpire called Louise out on a force play which led her to go to the bench. A protest on the decision is likely.

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## Savoie Wins Welter Title From Johnny Greco

MONTREAL, July 7—(CP)—Armand Savoie, Canadian lightweight champion, added the welterweight title tonight when he defeated champion Johnny Greco in a rousing 12-round bout.

Savoie weighed in at 135 pounds and Greco at 145 3/4.

Both fighters were on the verge of knockouts during the bout. Spectators, in shirt sleeves, were drenched in perspiration at the Montreal Forum, where the bout took place. It was one of Montreal's hottest nights on record.

The paid crowd was 4,690 with the gross gate \$12,943.50.

The decision was a split one. Jon Gow voted Savoie 6, Greco 5, and one even. Rene Oulmet voted similarly but the third judge, Jim Regan voted Greco 6, Savoie 5, and one even. Both fighters are Montrealers.

Savoie's speed gave him the advantage and he outboxed the heavier Greco.

In the fifth round, Greco appeared to lose the steam in his punches, and Savoie pounded him consistently, and Greco seemed

out on his feet.

In the 10th, Greco came back strongly and drove several hard jabs to Savoie's jaw. Savoie went down against the ropes but bounced back. He was wrestled down again for a no-count before the round ended.

As the 11th round opened, Savoie, realizing his sharp, speedy boxing had piled up points, stayed away from his heavier opponent and jabbed. He took this round by a slim margin, and hammered Greco in the last round, and the welterweight was almost out as the gong sounded.

The preliminaries, Bryan Kelly of Niagara Falls, Ont., 138 1/4, 137, in eight rounds, Jean Poirier of Niagara Falls, Ont., 144 1/2 and Pat Manziez, Syracuse, N. Y., fought to an eight-round draw.

Roger Chartrand of Montreal, 145 1/4, 144, 143, in four rounds and Joe Stack of Montreal, 185 1/4, fought to a four-round draw with Terry O'Connor of Syracuse, 147.

## N.L. Favored To Win Today's All-star Game

PHILADELPHIA, July 7—(AP)—A confident National League squad, its lineup bursting with power, its pitching poised and well rested, remained a solid 7-5 favorite today to capture its third straight from the injury-riddled

and undermanned American League in the 19th All-Star game.

A crowd of 32,750 was expected to fill Shibe Park tomorrow for the annual mid-summer clash, which will start at 1:30 p.m. EDT. The game will be broadcast and seen on television.

A cloudy, warm and humid day was predicted with a possibility of showers.

Leo Durocher, manager of New York Giants, arrived to take charge of the Nationals and named Curt Simmons (7-2), Philadelphia Phillies' southpaw, to pitch the first three innings.

Manager Casey Stengel of the Americans, nominated Vic Raschi (8-2) of his own New York Yankees to opposite Simmons.

Durocher planned to use Gerry Staley (11-6) of St. Louis Cardinals in the middle three innings and finish with either Bob Rush (9-6) of Chicago Cubs or his own Jim Heath (9-2).

Lemon (7-7) of Cleveland Indians would hurl the middle three innings. He could go no further for the obvious reason that two of his remaining pitchers are physically handicapped while the other two will have had sufficient rest at game time.

Stengel originally planned to start Bobby Shantz, brilliant little lefthander of Philadelphia Athletics, but Bobby complained of a pain in his chest while pitching against the Yanks Sunday and had to be excused after four innings.

Alvin Dark, who pitched the Yanks' superb right-hander with the lowest earned run average in the majors, is handicapped by a sprained right wrist.

Stengel probably will call on Satchel Paige (6-4) despite the fact that he pitched before losing to the Yankees in the Negro league last Sunday in relief.

The only other pitcher on the squad is Mike Garcia (11-6), sturdy right-hander of the Indians. Garcia, however, worked 13 innings Sunday before losing to the Yankees.

In sharp contrast the Nationals will go into the game with four well-rested hurlers. Neither Simmons, Staley, Rush or Heath has seen action since last Thursday.

Hydroplane Speed Record Broken

SEATTLE, July 7—(AP)—The wonder boat of 1960 roared back with a new engine today to boost the world hydroplane speed record to 178 miles an hour.

Stanley Sayres and his Slo-Mo-Shun IV added 18 miles an hour to the record they set together on Lake Washington two years ago.

Sayres actually hit a pace of 186.2 miles an hour in a run over the measured mile with the wind at his back.

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
