

Notice To The Public

At 8.00 A. M. of Saturday June 9th, 1951, the parking meters installed on the streets of Charlottetown, P. E. I. will be put in operation and cars—including small trucks—parked there will comply with the instructions on the side of meter.

These instructions are as follows—

ONE HOUR LIMIT

12 Minutes	1 cent
24 Minutes	2 cents
36 Minutes	3 cents
48 Minutes	4 cents
60 Minutes	5 cents (one nickel)

DAILY 8.00 A.M. to 6.00 P. M.

SATURDAY 8.00 R.M. to 9.00 P.M.

SUNDAYS AND HOLIDAYS EXCEPTED

Violations will be dealt with in accordance with penalties set out in the City By-law respecting meters.

All meters are installed where angle parking is allowed. The city by law prohibits the angle parking of vehicles of a greater overall length than an ordinary private passenger vehicle; therefore it will be illegal for large trucks to be in the metered area; i.e. parked in the angle parking zones.

We wish to co-operate fully with the public in their first weeks use of these meters and assure you that minor infractions will pass unnoticed, but major ones must be dealt with.

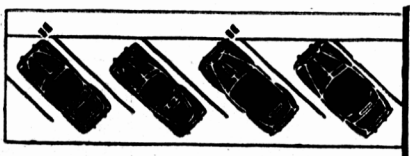

How to Park AT THE Alfco Twin AUTOMATIC Parking Meter

Alfco Twin Automatic Parking Meter brings a new, modern parking convenience to motorists.

Park your car so that your bumper is close to your side of the Alfco Twin Meter post. You will note an arrow pointing to your car, indicating your side of the meter head. Directly above the time scale (or red flag) is the coin slot. Before you deposit your money, read the instruction plate on the side of the meter. Then push your coin into the slot, and the meter will automatically register your parking time.

OLD AGE PENSIONS—Formal announcement of the Provincial Government's agreement to participate in the new old age pensions plan was made yesterday by Hon. A. W. Matheson, Minister of Health and Welfare. As already announced, the new plan becomes effective January 1, 1952. Pensions of \$40 for all over seventy will be paid entirely by the Federal Government. Pensions for those in the age group 65 to 69 years will be on a means test basis, with a maximum payment of \$40 a month, the Province assuming one-half the cost.

ASSUMES DUTIES—Dr. Temple Hooper has arrived back in the Province to take over the position as director of the Division of Cancer Control under the Provincial Department of Health and Welfare. He has been attending the Allan Blair Memorial Cancer Clinic in Regina for the past two years. Office space for Dr. Hooper's department has been arranged in the Health Centre on Prince Street.

CITY POLICE COURT—At the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court yesterday, a man charged with reckless driving was fined \$20 and costs or 20 days in jail, while two drunk and incapable were each fined \$10 and costs or 10 days. A third drunk and incapable was fined \$5 and costs or 10 days in jail and a drunk and disorderly was fined \$5 and costs or 10 days.

DOUBLE PAY ALLOWANCE—Local naval authorities have announced the doubling of pay allowance for reserves attending regular drill nights. In the past, thirty-two nights of drill were all a man could be paid for per year, no matter how many he had attended. This would amount to sixteen days' pay. Naval Headquarters at Ottawa have now decided reserves may be paid for as high as sixty-four drills, which is thirty-two days' pay. This is in addition to the fourteen days' pay received while training at the Coast, each year.

may yet put us on the map, even while it is blowing more favored communities off it.

After July 1st folks who pay the highest contributions required under the Unemployment Insurance Act, and who qualify as claimants will be paid more money when out of work. After the new rate goes into effect, married men in the higher paid brackets will receive slightly over \$21.00 per week, when unable to obtain employment. Single men who have been employed in well-paid jobs, will be given something over \$18.00 per week. Those whose weekly stamps have been a step or two below the highest denomination, will be paid in proportion. All claimants have to qualify of course as prescribed by the Act. There has been no change in this respect.

Wood-pulp is leaving the Island in considerable quantities, causing many to speculate how long the Province can stand the drain on its none too healthy forestry reserves.

The demands of the building trade and for pit-props have already reduced our wooded areas appreciably, and the present demand for wood pulp may clean up most of the remainder. Conservation plans said to be under advisement, could do much to guard against the Island becoming entirely stripped of its valuable trees.

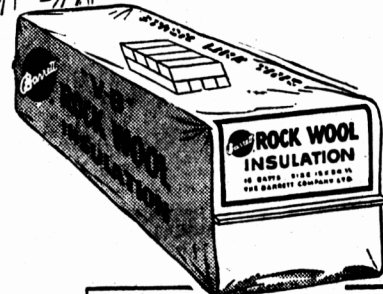

VETERINARY SERVICE POLICY

The Prince Edward Island Department of Agriculture announces the inauguration of veterinary service units centered at O'Leary, Summerside, Charlottetown and Montague. These units will service all parts of the Province. The veterinary surgeons practicing in these areas are fully qualified graduates of the Ontario Veterinary College. They are specialists in the prevention and treatment of livestock diseases. These units will operate on a scale of fees which will not prevent anyone from using this service. There will be no charge made for travelling expenses. This will mean that no matter where you live the service charge will be the same. Farmers are invited to make use of this service in dealing with their livestock problems.
