NOTICE TO THE PUBLIC.

THE attention of Citizens is directed to Section 163 of "The City of Charlottetown Incorporation Act," which reads as follows:—

"No cess-pool, ash-pit, manure-pit, or other place for the reception of slop, washings or drainings, shall be used in the said City of a greater depth than two feet below the surface of the ground, and all such cess-pools, ash-pits, manure-pits, or other receptacles as aforesaid, are of a greater depth, shall immediately be thoroughly cleaned and filled up with asphalt or clean clay."

Any person aware of the existence of such places will confer a favor upon the undersigned by reporting the same at once, as he is determined that the law shall be rigidly enforced.
