COLD STORAGE QUESTION

PROCEEDINGS OF THE AGRICULTURAL COMMITTEE. (Continued)

Committee met at 10.30, April 9th. Professor Robertson's letter to the Premier, dated April 1st, was put in evidence, and letters from several of the secretaries of cheese factories in different parts of the Island were brought before the Committee and read.

Mr. Dillon kindly sent to the Committee plates and explanations of "Hill's Patent Refrigerating Apparatus and Cooling Room," which were thankfully received and laid before the Committee.

Mr. FRED. PETERS, Premier, Charlottetown, P. E. Island: My Dear Sir, I received your telegram of March 27, and was unable to leave Ottawa I telegraphed you as follows: "March 28th—Cannot go to Charlottetown at present. Am writing you fully."

I am preparing a special bulletin on the question of cold storage, and I shall be glad to send you a copy of it as soon as it is received from the Queen's Printer. In the meantime I offer you as much information as is at my command to be put within the compass of a few lines.

To obtain profit from the production of perishable food products three different parts of the business have to be considered. There is the question of production, the question of collection and transportation, and the question of distribution.

On Prince Edward Island the perishable food products for which cold storage service would be used are cheese, butter, eggs, poultry, meat, fruit. The first three are only available in sufficient quantity to make cold storage accommodation for them necessary in the meantime.

Building and Method—The material of which the frame of the cold storage building is constructed is unimportant; perhaps some building already in existence in Charlottetown could be used for the purpose. The main requirement is that the building should be thoroughly insulated and fitted with refrigerating machinery of the best sort.

mixed with salt, and any temperature desired down to 12 degrees below freezing point can readily be obtained by that method.

COMMODITIES TO BE STORED. Cheese—For the storage of cheese a dry atmosphere at a temperature at about 36 degrees Fahrenheit gives the best results.

Butter—Butter should be stored in a fairly dry atmosphere in a dark room, at a temperature not above 32 degrees Fahrenheit. This insures that it will stay practically unchanged in flavor and quality for several months.

Eggs—For the storage of eggs a temperature of from 34 to 36 degrees gives excellent results. The main use of a good storage building for eggs would be in inducing the egg merchants to collect strictly fresh laid eggs from the farmers twice a week, keeping these entirely separate from lots of mixed eggs which may have been gathered in shops or left in wicker or cellar for several days or weeks.

Charges.—I think the charges for storage of these perishable food products should be made as low as possible. The rates charged to me in Montreal last summer were from 3 1/2 to 5 cents per box of cheese per month while in cold storage, and one cent per box per month after the weather became cold.

The charges for the storage of butter being from 34 to 12 cents one hundred pounds of butter per month. I do not think that charges similar to these would yield sufficient revenue for the first year in Charlottetown to make the business self-sustaining or profitable to the owners, but I think it would enable the farmers to realize higher prices for their products, and in the course of a year or two become a source of revenue to the owners, whether they were a private corporation or the Provincial Government.

I am to continue to manage the business at some of the smaller cheese factories on Prince Edward Island, and if a cold storage warehouse is provided in Charlottetown I shall use it for the storage of the daily produce, which I may direct, in preference to sending them to Montreal.

HOMESTEAD SELECTION IN NEW SOUTH WALES.

Considerable improvements have recently been effected in the land laws of New South Wales, one of the principal being the introduction of the system of homestead selections, which is admirably adapted for settlers of limited means and having some knowledge of agricultural work.

The Act by which the homestead selection system was introduced, is entitled to apply for a selection, the area that may be selected being fixed according to the capabilities of the land; but in no case can it exceed 1,280 acres, and the selector is bound to take the block he applies for as it is granted.
