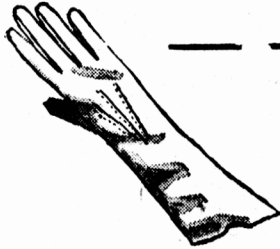

Shea and Dr. S. Bandler. Assessors will be appointed at the next meeting of the Council. Mr. Edward W. Hardy was re-appointed policeman for a period of six months. On motion, the meeting was adjourned.



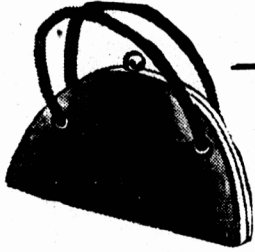

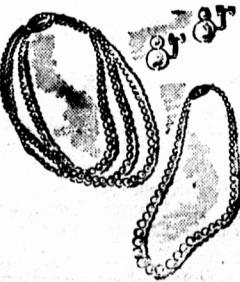
