### LECTURE ON EDUCATION.

Hon Mr. Hill Addresses Teachers  
Last Night About Their Requirements.

The lecture of Hon. Frank A. Hill in Y. M. C. A. Hall last evening was along one of the most important lines of education,—the needs of the teacher by which to properly train the child. Mr. Hill is a very pleasing speaker, and his fine oratory and occasional humor enriched an already excellent address.

The speaker began his lecture by referring to the close bond between Great Britain and the United States, and hoped it would never die.

The primary need of the modern teacher, he said, is higher scholarship, not that for his own culture and for teaching. The primary teacher requires a high education as well as the teacher in advanced grades. Many a good teacher might be made better by a higher academic training.

The second demand of the modern teacher is greatness of soul. Though this may not be actual in the teacher it is potential, and the germ of it are susceptible of cultivation. The mind of the child must be connected with the mind of the teacher; and the teacher who ignores the little things of the child-mind loses the only ground of anchorage for instruction. The limit of the child's mind marks the range that the teacher should go in imparting knowledge. Forgetting mere bits of information is not education. The first graspings of the child's mind is for simple things, and by giving a simple idea to the child it can be coupled with another idea bearing some relation to the former. This is one of the best forms of instruction, and by its cultivation by the teacher the mind of the child is continually expanded. His self-activity of the child is his greatest hope, and the child's education is at its best when his self activity is at its best.

Besides having high scholarly attainments and greatness of soul the teacher needs method of instruction. A bad method destroys the pupil's attention, while a good one secures and retains it. The lecture was filled with practical advice for the teachers, and doubtless our schools will benefit from their exposure of the lecturer's ideals set before them. One of Mr Hill's remarks was that no pupil should be called stupid; if he is not he should not be told so, and if he is he should not be reminded of it.

Dr. Anderson moved a vote of thanks, supported by Dr. Macleod. D. Taylor seconded the motion. "God save the Queen" closed the proceedings.

### Local and Other Items.

**HORSE SOLD.**—Mr. T B Riley, tobacco manufacturer, sold today to parties in New Brunswick a handsome draft horse weighing about 1600 pounds. We understand that the price paid was away up, and congratulate the purchaser, as the horse was one of the best seen on the streets.

**MUST SERVE HIS TIME.**—An Ottawa despatch says: The Governor General has revoked the license of George Donovon, ticket-of-leave man, as he has been re-arrested. The prisoner was released from Dorchester, N. B., on license, but was arrested for larceny afterwards. He is now serving a sentence for the latter crime and when he gets out will be taken into custody again to complete his original time.

**THE SUGAR BEET INDUSTRY.**—The Farmer says: We are informed that the proposed sugar beet factory for Prince County is meeting with the support of the farmers, a large acreage having now been promised. A mass meeting of those interested in the movement will be held at Tignish on Saturday next. The president of the company proposing to establish this factory is expected at Charlottetown for the Exhibition and will no doubt visit the west of the province before his return.

### HOME FROM AFRICA.

Five Other Islanders Home—Rousing Reception.

Although it was after midnight when the express arrived from the west there were thousands of people at the station to welcome Sergeant Hessian and Privates Holl, Walker, Piggott and Lane, who have been invaded home from South Africa. There was also a large turnout of the militia with the band of the Fourth Regiment.

The returning soldiers were lustily cheered as they came off the train, and afterwards were escorted to carriages in waiting in which they were driven to the Market Square. The great crowd followed them to the Square, and hundreds of people lined the street to see the procession go by. The cheering which greeted the returning soldiers at the station was renewed as they passed along.

At the square the boys were warmly welcomed by Premier Farquharson on behalf of the Province, and by Mayor Warburton on behalf of the city. Col. Moore, for the militia also extended a hearty welcome.

Sergeant Hessian spoke in reply, thanking the people for the hearty welcome, and giving a brief account of the battle of Paardeberg, speaking highly of his departed brothers-in-arms, Roland Taylor and Alfred Riggs. Ptes. Walker and Holl also spoke, returning thanks for the great kindness shown them.

The proceedings closed with rousing cheers for the returned heroes and the Queen.

### WEDNESDAY NIGHT'S SHOW.

Display of Fireworks—Trapeze and Acrobatic Work.

There was a large attendance at the grounds last night to witness the display of fireworks, and the specialties by Messrs Kelly and Ashby and Mr. Dewell. The fireworks were on a magnificent scale. Besides a good many rockets, there were balloons, war rockets, and mines, etc., and a capital representation Lord Roberts, "Our Bob," the band playing "Soldiers of the Queen" as an accompaniment to the latter piece and the crowd applauding vigorously. Mr. Dewell, in addition to his trapeze work, gave an exhibition of his skill with heavy weights, and Kelly and Ashby repeated the success of the afternoon.
