Begin Street Mail Delivery Survey In S'side

In connection with the proposed survey of the Town of Summerside for the purpose of ascertaining the possibilities of having street mail delivery here, two officials of the Post Office Department, Mr. Gibbons of Saint John and Mr. Fred Coyle, post office inspector for Prince Edward Island arrived yesterday and began work on the project which it is understood will take two or three days to complete.

The matter of street delivery in Summerside is one which has been strongly advocated over a period of years and during the past year in particular the Town Council, the Board of Trade and the Canadian Legion have been making strong representations to the postal authorities through various channels with the result that the survey is now under way and it is hoped that this service will be granted to the Town before the end of the coming year.

The defeated candidates were D. B. Nicholson, Roderick MacNevin and John Rochford. The results of balloting were as follows: Matthews 87; Currie 86; Corbett 77; Weeks 71; Burke 68; Proffitt 65; Nicholson 40; MacNevin 30; Rochford 28.

IN KING'S COUNTY
Declaration in King's County, for the town councils of Montague, Georgetown, and Souris, resulted in acclamation in each case. The expected election in Souris between C. Edwin Lavie, and Bruce Stewart, failed to materialize, since Mr. Stewart withdrew. In all other cases respecting mayors and councillors there had been only required number to form the council, with no one opposing.

In Montague the declaration and swearing in of the council took place at the office of the town clerk, Mr. B. N. Hooley, with Mr. R. K. Clements officiating. The council comprises Mayor B. H. Veo, motion picture exhibitor, who served three terms on the Council; Lester MacLeod of the firm of MacLeod and Greene, plumbing and heating, who is serving his first term; Harry Jamieson, druggist, first term; Marshall Reynolds, of the firm of Poole and Thompson, third term, and two terms as mayor; S. S. Heslan, K.C. second term; Major Doug McGowan, McGowan Motors, first term, and Claude Nicholson, manager of Montague Garage, first term.

In Souris, the Council will elect Mayor C. Edwin Lavie, electrician, who served as mayor for the past two years, and councillors, C. N. Richards, motion picture exhibitor, who is serving his first term; Angus McCormac, painter, who served last year replacing one of the retired councillors; Alex Mooney, blacksmith, also served last year, replacing a retired councillor; Sterling Gillespie, manager of Central Creameries, who is serving his first term; Arthur Peters, manager of Eastern Cold Storage, who is serving his second term; and Andrew Mearns, manager Community Centre, who is serving his fourth term.

In Georgetown the council will undergo little change. Mayor Percy Boudreau will preside for the second successive term. Mr. Boudreau has already served several terms on the council, and has also served two terms as mayor prior to the present two terms. Fifth Atomic Blast Is Biggest Of Series; Experiments End

LAS VEGAS, Nev., Feb. 6.—(AP)—The fifth and biggest atomic blast at the new Government range near here shook Las Vegas today and shattered show windows. The Atomic Energy Commission announced that it had concluded its experiments for the present and is "completely satisfied" with the results.

Said Carroll L. Tyler, manager of the tests for the A. E. C. in a statement: "Use of the Las Vegas site has saved manpower, materials, money and, above all, invaluable time in the national atomic energy development program."

No one was injured, either among A. E. C. personnel or residents of this Southern Nevada resort city, Tyler said.

Today's blast, as previously just before dawn, hit Las Vegas with two stiff jolts.

"Bigger than Bikini," was the description of Los Angeles newspaper Clete Roberts, who also witnessed the Pacific Island tests. "The worst yet," said Las Vegas Police Capt. George Thompson.

Today's was No. 14 in a world-wide series of atom blasts, starting in New Mexico in mid-summer, 1945, and including those at Hiroshima and Nagasaki, and one set off by the Russians.

Friday's fourth test here splintered a window in a furniture store. Today's concussion knocked out two in auto agencies.

Two Los Angeles television stations, KTLA and KTTV, photographed the sight from atop 5,710-foot Mt. Wilson, near Pasadena and thousands of early-risers saw the glare light up their screens. "It was splendid," said one watcher.

Despite a fog, the glare came through the mist in Los Angeles. One woman said she dropped to her knees and "prayed there will never be another one."

The concussion also shook houses and rattled windows in Los Angeles, 300 miles away, and glasses set on a windowsill by an experimenter clinked in Bountiful, Utah, 355 miles away. The flash was seen in Boise, Idaho, 500 miles distant, and in many other parts of the west.
