POLICE INSPECTIONS.—The police were inspected this forenoon by His Honor the Stipendiary Magistrate. His Honor gave particular instructions upon two matters which required to be promptly dealt with. The corner loading nuisance must be suppressed. In this connection he instructed the police to furnish him with the names of all persons loading about the corners or in the entrances to business places, with a view to having them appear before the court. Other cities are not annoyed with this kind of nuisance, and he saw no reason why Charlottetown should have to tolerate it. The Magistrate also made special reference to the now too frequently recurring charivari with which Charlottetown was being visited of late, and gave notice of his intention to suppress it also. He referred to the serious consequences which frequently followed the illegal and disorderly conduct of parties participating in such practices, and intimated that the proper time to conduct them here was before any serious accident happened. He instructed the police, one and all, whether on duty or off duty, to be watchful of persons participating in such unlawful assemblies. He told them to take the names of all such persons and report to him, and promised that they as well as the corner-loaders, would be promptly dealt with.

THE HYAMS CASE.—The trial of the Hyams twins at Toronto, for the murder of young Wells, is again winding its weary length—this time being Mr. Justice Ferguson. The prosecution yesterday made a determined effort to get in evidence to show that the twins endeavored to insure the life of Martha Wells for \$20,000, but the Court rejected the evidence. During the argument of the legal points the jury were removed from the court room. This course was adopted by Chief Justice Meredith at the former trial. The rejection of this evidence is said to be a strong point in favor of the defence.
