Death of Sir Francis Hincks.

OTTAWA, Aug. 20. General regret is expressed here at the death of Sir Francis Hincks, of smallpox, in Montreal. Sir Francis was alone at the time of his death; no one but his servants were present; no one but his family were away at their summer quarters. It is not known how he contracted the disease.

MONTREAL has at last become aroused to action, and active measures are being made to prevent a further spread of the disease in the city. Employers of labor refuse to employ unless the applicants are themselves, and all their families vaccinated. The opposition to vaccination in Montreal is generally condemned.

Movements of Ministers

OTTAWA, Aug. 20. Sir Charles Tupper and Hon. John Henry Pope have gone to Quebec. They will thence go to River de Loup, where they will remain with Sir John Macdonald for two or three days. Hon. Messrs. Bowell and Caron are already there, and Sir Hector Langevin is shortly to arrive. They will hold a Cabinet Council.

OTTAWA, Aug. 20. The Quebec Press Association in conjunction with the Ontario Press Association others, propose banqueting Hon. Thomas White. Mr. White has been for over twenty-five years a member of the press gallery, and for many years its President.

Canon Farrar.

BOSTON, Aug. 20. Canon Farrar is expected to arrive at Quebec on the 11th of September. After a few days slight seeing in Canada he will make a tour of the United States, where he will deliver a series of lectures. He will return to England late in November.

Davitt Yields to Parnell

TO TAKE THE STUMP FOR HIS CANDIDATES FOR PARLIAMENT.

Says a London despatch of the 16th inst.: The speech of Michael Davitt at Longford in which he pledged himself to support the Parnellite candidates in the general elections, is widely commented upon. It has caused much relief and dispelled doubts which had existed in many minds as to Mr. Davitt's course and the mischief it might cause. It is believed, however, that Mr. Davitt's profession of loyalty does not mean a permanent submission, but only a long truce in face of the common enemy.

Mr. Davitt has always admitted that the work of the Irish parliamentary party was useful in its way, but he insists that there is other and more important work to be done outside of Parliament in keeping up the agrarian agitation in Ireland. Mr. Parnell wants to control both branches of the work, and to start or stop outside agitation as he sees fit in order to have it contribute to results he is aiming at in Parliament. Just now he wants to have the agitation stopped in order to concentrate the energies of the whole party on what he deems the most important task of securing the largest possible number of seats in the next Parliament. Mr. Davitt has yielded so far as to promise his co-operation on the stump, and to keep his propaganda in the background until November. Farther than that, it is understood he would not go, and he still threatens to rekindle the embers of the no-rent crusade throughout Ireland next winter. He is making speeches almost daily in the Irish midland counties, and his language is as bitter and aggressive as ever. To-day he addressed a large meeting at Lanesborough, in County Roscommon, and after commending the work of the Parnellites in Parliament, he again urged his old panacea for driving the landlords out of Ireland by making their property worthless. Just before his speech he advised the Government reporter to vacate the platform, and the reporter wisely consented.

A Nationalist demonstration which was to have been held on the 16th at Coagh, in County Tyrone, was prevented by the authorities, but without any bloodshed or serious trouble. As the Nationalists attempted to enter the village they were repulsed by a body of Lancers drawn up across the main street. The Nationalists retired sullenly but peacefully, while the Orange men of Coagh grinned, danced, and shouted with delight under the protecting cover of the British lances.

Scotch Ship-building.

Ship-building on the Clyde is at a low ebb. During the first seven months of the present year the tonnage built has been less than in the same period in any year for the last ten, with two exceptions. In the last seven months the tonnage reached 103,815 tons. In 1883, when the highest figures of the ten years was reached, the tonnage was 227,595; in 1887 the tonnage touched the lowest point 94,400 tons.

During the month twenty-one vessels of 9,890 tons were launched, being sixteen steamers of 4 018 and five sailing ships of 5,872 tons. Even in comparison with the past months of the present year there is a very decided decline. January had 11,170 to its credit; February, 14,020; March, 13,126; April, 18,860; May, 18,157; June, 18,592; and now July has fallen almost 50 per cent—to 9,890. The following table, which we take from the Glasgow Herald, will show the tonnage in July and in the past seven months of the present year as against the same period in the preceding ten years—

Messrs. Napier & Sons, Govan, have received orders from the Russian Government to construct engines of 12,600 indicated horse power for the steamer Simope, now under construction at Sebastopol. The engines were designed by N. C. Kirk, who received a premium from the Russian Government. This Russian order will keep the Napiers employed for two years. Should war break out, the work would have to stop. In peace Great Britain supplies her possible enemies with the engines and implements of war. These are the largest engines for a war-ship ever undertaken; so that if they be completed Russia would have superior steamship power, if less of it, than Great Britain. The world is full of anomalies and this is one of them.
