

Massacre Wipes Out All Males In Algerian Village

ALGIERS (AP) — Fanatic Algerian nationalist rebels swooped down on a mud-hut village Wednesday and massacred 302 of their fellow Muslims in a vicious mass slaying.

The slaughter created a storm of anger in French and Algerian newspapers. Mass circulation Paris newspapers estimated the death toll as high as 500.

It appeared certain the massacre will intensify French measures to subdue the 2½-year-old rebellion in France's last North African possession.

The hor... came to light when barefooted women refugees from Melouza staggered, some crazed by what they had seen, into a French outpost and reported the slaying of their men.

Melouza is a tiny village in rockstrewn barren land 80 miles southeast of this capital city.

The general staff of the French garrison in the area said rebel killers slipped over the border from neighboring Tunisia Tuesday night and killed five men in the village suspected to being pro-French.

(Algerian nationalists in Tunisia blamed the massacre 'on the French.)

WORST OF REBELLION

The rest of the population protested and, the next night, a herd of rebels swooped down and put the entire male population to death.

It was the worst single blood-letting of the rebellion.

The killers, operating in groups of 10 and 12, herded the women, and children under 15, aside and slaughtered the males with gunfire, knives and hatchets.

When rescuing soldiers arrived at the site, hardened Legionnaires had their stomachs turned by the carnage. A vaguely mutilated bodies, giving off the stench of a slaughterhouse, were strewn about. In one hut, 35 bodies were found stacked like cordwood.

EYEWITNESS REPORT

First eyewitness report on the raid came from a man who was fired on by the insurgents and left for dead. The survivor, Bara Said Ben Mohamed, told a reporter:

"Groups of rebels in uniform surrounded our hamlet. Anyone who tried to escape was shot down mercilessly.

"All the men were collected together and marched to the casbah under guard. Other set fire to huts.

"Achief of the band shouted at us: 'You have sheltered French soldiers. You are bad Moslems.

Polish Communists Resent Return Of Religious Teaching

WARSAW (AP) — Polish Communists are stepping up their charges of intolerance against Roman Catholics. These charges are accompanied by complaints that the party's anti-religious propaganda is inadequate.

The great majority of Poles are members of the Roman Catholic Church. In rural areas especially the church has immense influence. It survived the years of Stalinist repression and now many of the Communists are afraid they are losing the battle of rival ideologies.

The main point of attack is the church activity in schools. Religious instruction was brought back to schools last year as an optional subject. The Communists say Catholic parents are using blackmail and even force to press religious instruction on children of non-Catholics.

"Whether we like it or not, we are ideologically on the defensive," says the weekly magazine Swiat.

Party members and even party officials often send their children to religious classes.

It accuses parents and priests of using pressure against teachers who do not go to church. In some cases, it says, Communist state authorities have even yielded to these pressure and dismissed non-believing teachers.
