MISCELLANEOUS.

THE ABYSSINIAN EXPEDITION.

Mr. Smith, chaplain to Bishop Gobat, writes as follows in reference to a rather reproachful

mention which has been made of the German artist at Gaffat as engaged in making

artillery for King Theodore.—Several years ago, long before any of the present untoward

events had occurred, the Anglican Bishop in Jerusalem received a communication from

Theodore, who he knew as a boy when he lived in Abyssinia, informing him of his suc-

cession to the throne and of his desire to im-

prove the condition of his country and people by instructing them in various branches

of science, and asking the Bishop to supply him with workmen for this purpose. The Bishop con-

sented on the condition that the men he sent should be allowed to distribute the Scriptures,

and, as opportunity occurred, instruct the people. This was accepted, and six men

trained in the Missionary College at Crichester were sent. Mr. Bell had been in the country

seven or eight years, and had always been, and still are, in high favor with the King.

One of them only is a gunmaker, and the others are employed in other ways, carpentering,

engineering, road-making, &c. It is to these men that the captives, as Mr. Stern has

acknowledged, owe much of their civilization, and of their suffering, and in one instance, their

lives.—They have made use of their favorable position with the King by several efforts

to induce him to liberate the captives, but without avail. It is evidently to the interest

of our unfortunate fellow-countrymen that these men should not, by refusal to act under

Theodore's commands, forfeit their lives, and that of our communications with

the King should have been interrupted, as they could give most valuable information as

to the nature and resources of the country.

Mr. K. Jones Perceval writes to the following effect:—Having a commercial

depot on the island of Massowah, in 1858, 1859, and 1860, I made myself thoroughly

acquainted with the different routes from the coast of the Red Sea to the interior of Abys-

sinia. The most practical roads are through

Archie, along the Shillikee Pass, via Wood-

jah and Kiar, also the passes of Sattoa

and Alet, the former via Kiar, and the latter via Asmara and Costofalasso. It is

throwing away money for nothing to attempt to force a passage through the mountains

of the interior, for, no matter the route taken, camels can only be used as far

as Kiar or Sattoa, and to the foot of the hills of Asmara, via Alet. The army must

remain for a day or two on the plains of Kiar, in order to make the road between

the "village" and the "Morb" passable for mules and other transport, and to

renew the water supply, for the water is almost certain the expedition will have

assembled the object in view without going one foot farther than the plains of

Costofalasso, where everything required for the army can be procured for hard cash.
