"HALLS OF MONTEZUMA" AT CAPITOL

"Halls of Montezuma" concentrates on a platoon of marines to reveal, with great poignant feeling, how war affects the individual, his emotions and aspirations. The central role of platoon lieutenant falls to Richard Widmark. With many a fine characterization to the credit of this actor from "Kiss of Death" to "No Way Out," none will rank higher in his book than this one. He captures the spirit and heart that lifts "Halls of Montezuma" into a rare class of films that encompasses vast scope and intimate drama.

Also prominent are Walter (Jack) Palanca, recalled from another Widmark hit, "Panic in the Streets," and Reginald Gardiner, more accustomed to polished comedy than rugged drama. Both count heavily in the series of portrayals of men under stress unfolded by the film. As victims under fire, young Skip Homeier, Gregory Peck's nemesis in "The Gun-fighter," and astute Karl Malden, stage and screen actor in "A Streetcar Named Desire," are expert. Newer to the theatre arts are Robert Wagner, Richard Hylton, Richard Boone, Don Hicks, Jack Webb, Bert Freed and Neville Brand. Many are actual veterans of World War II, though one or two are too young to have been in. All acquit themselves handsomely in "Halls of Montezuma."
