NOVA SCOTIA EXHIBITION.

The display in all the departments is the best ever made in Halifax. Owing to the incompleteness of the race track the manage-ment ordered the postponement till tomor-row of the horse races set down for today.

OTTAWA, Sept. 29.—Sir Richard Cart-wright, is holding a conference here with the steamship men in reference to ocean mails service.

The Sovereign Grand Lodge of Oddfel-lows held three sessions at Springfield, Ill., on Friday to clear up the work before adjourning on Saturday. A resolution was passed after a strong fight providing that after January 1st, 1897, no grand or supreme body shall receive any considera-tion for old rituals destroyed or returned, but shall pay full price for all rituals furnished. There is little doubt that the Rebekah ritual will be revised, as there has been much dissatisfaction over it. The Oddfellows' international press associa-tion met on Friday in annual session, and elected the following officers: H. C. Stevens, Topeka, president; R. H. Shaaks, Winnipeg, Man., vice president; and J. W. Bourlet, Concord, N. H., secretary and treasurer.

BERBER EVACUATED

Nearly a month ago it was announced that spies had reported the evacuation of Berber by the Dervishes, so that the occupation of the place by friendly Soudanese has been easily effected without fighting. Berber is about one hundred miles east by south from Abu Hamed, which fell into the hands of the Anglo-Egyptian force after severe fighting on Aug. 7. The Fifth Cataract is between Abu Hamed and Berber, and the possession of the last-named place by General Kitchener's column enables the gunboats of the expedition to pass that cataract, as they passed the Fourth Cataract a few days earlier. Previously in the season it was understood that the English Government had not intended to continue the advance upon Khartoum until next year, but their plans were necessarily modified by the action of the Khalifa, who was so seriously alarmed by the rapid advance of the railroad across the desert that he began preparations for immediate hostilities on a huge scale at Omdurman, opposite Khartoum. There he collected no less than 20,000 camels three months ago, preparatory to an attack upon the Anglo-Egyptian expedition, with the object of arresting its progress and prevent-ing the railroad from reaching the banks of the Nile.

Three thousand men are employed in building this railroad, many of them being Dervishes who have been captured by the Anglo-Egyptian force. They have proved good workers, displaying the most cheer-ful disposition, and continually laughing like children amused with a new toy. The military railroad cuts across the Nubian desert in the south east direction from Wady Fa fa to Abu Hamed, thereby avoiding the long detour that would have been necessary if the line had been run around the great bend of the Nile. The railway is being constructed at the rate of more than a mile a day. This rapid work involves very hard labour, but the climate is a healthy one, and the temperature at night so low that blankets are necessary for comfort.
