Most people suppose that the manufacture of tobacco consists merely of taking the leaf and pressing and pressing it into plugs. The fact is, however, that the process is a very delicate one, and the least false step will injure the flavor. The leaf must be carefully attended to for months after it leaves the planter's hand. It must neither dry too quickly or too slowly. Even after it has reached the factory the utmost delicacy of manipulation is required. The weather must be carefully studied, for if there is too much moisture in the air when it is pressed it will mold, and the same will happen if too much moisture is sprinkled upon it for the purpose of opening the leaf. Again, if it is over-dried in the oven it will turn crisp, and will slip the tongue in smoking. It is by careful attention to all these points that the "Myrtle Navy" has been brought to such perfection.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

House of Commons.

A Debate on Lieut-Governor Carvell's Act.

Mr. Davies Wants Information

OTTAWA, May 7.
Mr. L. H. Davies brought the attention of the Government to the fact that a bill was passed during the last meeting of the Prince Edward Island Legislature making changes in the Legislature there, and also abolishing their Upper House. He had received a message from the Attorney-General stating that the Lieutenant-Governor had withheld giving his consent to the bill. He wanted to know if instructions were given by the Dominion Government to this effect. He then quoted opinions of Sir John Macdonald and Chief Justice Macdonald of Nova Scotia when he was Minister of Justice, showing that Lieutenant-Governors were bound to act as their constitutional advisers desired them. In this regard, the request for him not to assent to any bill ought to come from the Governor-General. He would like to hear the opinion of the Minister of Justice as to the constitutionality of the question.

Sir John Thompson in replying, said that there were no general instructions or special instructions given to Lieut-Governors. In the present case he did not know until the hon. gentleman mentioned the fact that the bill had been withheld by the Lieut-Governor. Instructions given to Lieut-Governors were annexed to their commissions. He would not like to say just then as to what instructions were given in reference to assent. He was sure they would not conflict with opinions laid down by Sir John Macdonald and Chief Justice Macdonald. With these opinions he concurred. No correspondence was had with the Lieut-Governor or any member of the Dominion Government regarding it, and he did not think that Mr. Davies was correctly informed in saying that the Lieutenant-Governor acted contrary to the voice of the Executive.

Mr. Davies—My information came from the Attorney-General. I received a despatch from him.

Sir John—But the Attorney-General could not have told the hon. gentleman what the Lieutenant-Governor was advised to do.

Laurier said that if the Lieutenant-Governor had refused assent against the will of his advisers it became an important question.

The Lobster Bill

OTTAWA, May 7.
When the House met Hon. C. H. Tupper's bill in regard to lobsters was presented. In the committee a discussion took place on the section for providing for labelling cases of lobsters, Tupper suggesting some amendment so as to insure that foreign lobsters were not imported and sold as Canadian packed. All imported cases were to be marked as the minister should determine. A variety of ways was shown as to how the law could be violated. The minister proposed that the committee should rise and report progress. He would frame a clause which should better meet the case than the one which was in the bill. Agreed to.

The Intercolonial Railway.

OTTAWA, May 7.
All the canal estimates were passed yesterday, after which railways were taken up and it was arranged to pass all Intercolonial items except one, upon which a general discussion would take place on the whole road.

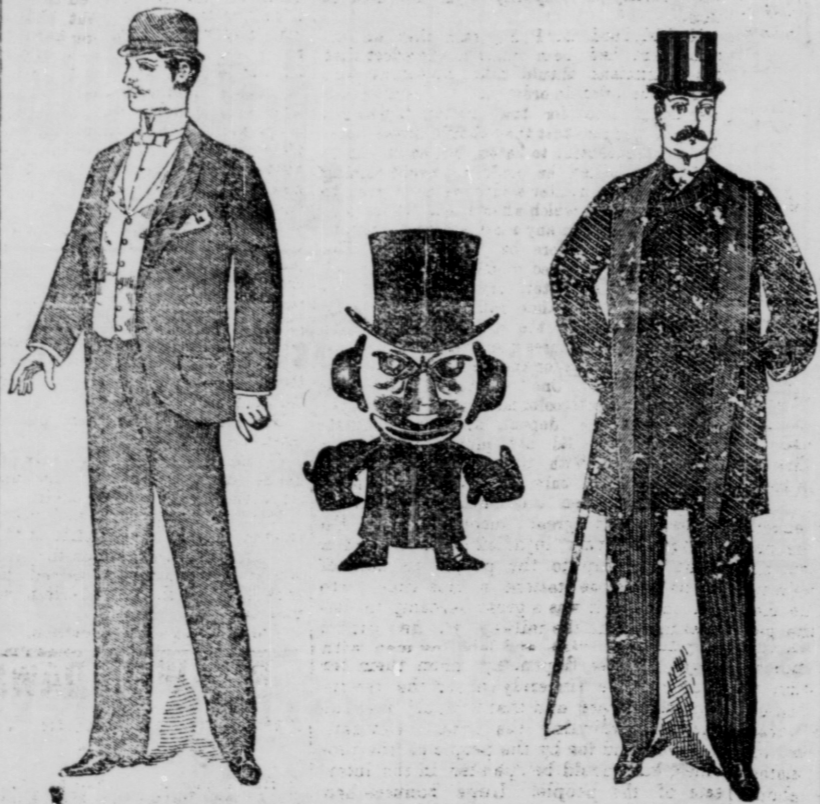
