A RESIDENT of Chicago has filed a claim at the Treasury Department for the redemption of a \$1,000 United States bond, which he says he swallowed in order to prevent its falling into the hands of burglars.

MR. CHAMBERLAIN has drawn up a scheme to settle the Irish question on the Canadian federation plan. It is expected that Mr. Gladstone will summon the whole Liberal Party to consider the matter.

G. H. Cook & Co. have introduced the Sunbeam photo, which is so popular in the United States and Canada, and are determined to maintain the reputation of their photos for truthful likeness, and artistic finish, second to none in the city.

ONE of the most expensive work architects have now in hand is a new Congress Hall for Buenos Ayres. This is to cost \$10,000,000 and is to be built in four years. It is to be in the Renaissance style, its dimensions being 1,200 feet by 900 feet. The site covers 20 acres in the best part of the city.

THE Bangor, Me., hackmen made quite a sum of money by their recent ball, having sold nearly 900 tickets at \$1 a piece, and quite a number of gallery tickets besides. It was found that, all bills being settled, each man's share amounted to \$12.25, a good little sum, and enough to repay them for their efforts.

On Wednesday afternoon, 11th ult., says the New Glasgow, N. S., Chronicle, as Mr. James Morton, boiler maker and repairer, at the N. S. Forge, was oiling the pulleys above the engine, his foot slipped, and falling down, he was caught in the driving belt, but the engine was stopped in time to save his life. His skull was fractured badly, his leg broken above the knee, besides being otherwise badly bruised. He was unconscious for three days, and at the present is very little, if any better.

The New Glasgow, N. S., Chronicle says that on Tuesday evening, about 7.30 o'clock, as Alfred Creighton, of Green Hill, and two of his friends were leisurely driving up Progress street, Edward McDonald, of Sunny Bess, E. R., and Isaac McKay, blacksmith, were driving in the opposite direction, and came into violent collision, meeting with a terrible shock. Creighton's horse was pierced in the lungs by the shaft of the other sleigh and in a few minutes died to death. The other horse ran on to the next corner, where he fell. Both horses were dead in about ten minutes.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

(SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.) EARTHQUAKE HORRORS Over One Thousand Killed.

SLEEPING IN THE OPEN AIR

SAVONA, Feb. 22. Beyond Sauceris, the serious region of the earthquake, the worst place was Diano Marino, on account of flaws in the strata, for the earthquake certainly did not have its centre there. The small, detached houses, especially those that are isolated, are ruined. All the large buildings affected are those near or on the street corners, and this is owing to the bad masonry work of modern times. Cellaco was shaken, bottles were broken, and casks became leaky, and a low wall had fallen down. From Vado to Taggia, near San Remo, a distance of 50 miles, nearly every town and village on the coast was wholly or partially ruined, and so were many in the valleys. Nearly the whole population is sleeping in the open air. Deaths estimated over a thousand. Mentone is the only town outside of the region which suffered much. At Bardo the church fell during early mass, burying 150 people, and nearly all the houses have fallen. Basana is completely destroyed. At Diano, Castello, a few lives were lost. Nearly every house is ruined. The panic continues. Everywhere wild reports are flying about predicting fresh shocks. At 11 o'clock on Saturday, at Turin, while crowds were waiting at the station, expecting the King to pass through, a shattered house near by fell in with an awful crash, causing great alarm.

LONDON, March 1. Slight earthquake shocks were felt yesterday at Itaca, Alassio and Albenga.

Declaration Day.

DORCHESTER, N. B., March 1. Declaration Day passed very quietly. Mr. Wood (Conservative) was declared elected, having received 3,252 votes; Mr. Emmerson (Liberal) received 2,710.

ST. ANDREW'S, N. B., March 1.

Declaration in Charlotte County resulted in the return of Mr. Gilmore, who received 1892 votes. Mr. Chipman (government) received 1811.

The Pictou Election.

PICTOU, March 1. Wm. Cameron, of Sutherland's River, was to-day elected unopposed in Pictou County to the seat in the House of Assembly vacated by Hon. A. C. Bell.

Mr. Chapleau's Reception.

OTTAWA, March 1. Hon. Mr. Chapleau arrived to-day and met with a hearty reception. The Secretary of State not being well, the reception took place in the Russell House.

Elected by Acclamation.

ANTIGONISH, March 1. Angus McGillivray, who resigned his seat in the Local House to oppose Minister of Justice Thompson, was to-day re-elected unopposed to his old place.

A Report Denied.

LONDON, March 1. The Exchange Telegraph Company denies the report that Prince Bismarck would ask for General Boulanger's retirement from the French Cabinet.

White on the Stump.

OTTAWA, March 1. Hon. Mr. White has arrived at Port Arthur. He is working for the Conservative candidate in Algoma.

A Cabinet Council.

OTTAWA, March 1. A Cabinet council was held to-day. Meeting at three and breaking up at six o'clock.

Blockade Broken.

OTTAWA, March 1. The snow blockade was broken to-day, and trains from East and West have arrived.

Majority Increased.

OTTAWA, March 1. Sir John's majority in Kingston has, on a recount, been increased to 17.

Montreal's Mayor.

MONTREAL, March 1. Mr. Abbott was elected Mayor to-day by a majority of 1,700.

Hon. Mr. Carling's Arrival.

OTTAWA, March 1. Hon. Mr. Carling arrived to-day.

Weather Bulletin.

TORONTO, March 2—10 a.m. Winds shifting to east and south, fair weather, cloudy, rising temperature; milder to-morrow.

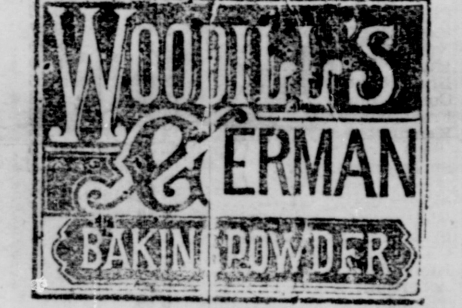

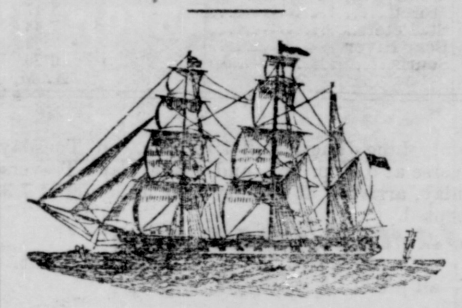
