THE MARKET.—There was a fair attendance at the market to-day with trade moderate. Eggs were in fair supply at 18 to 20 cents per dozen. Butter, fresh, sold at 20 to 22 cents per lb. and tub at 19 cents per lb. Geese were in good supply at 50 to 65 cents each. Hvy was on sale in good supply at 50 to 60 cents per 100 lb. Oats, fair, selling at 34 cents per bushel. Potatoes 23 to 24 cents per bushel, and extra Bluffs and Garnets at 25 cents per bushel. Turnips in good supply at 12 to 15 cents per bushel.

INFORMATION WANTED.—Mr. W. W. Clarke, of this city, would like to hear from the parents or other relatives of Peter McRae, who ran away from his home at Millbrook in 1883. The father's name was Parker McRae. According to a letter received by Mr. Clarke from Mr. E. E. Robins, formerly of Charlottetown, Peter McRae is now in the Sandwich Islands, where he is the overseer of a sugar plantation, and would like to communicate with his parents.

A POINTER FOR CHARLOTTETOWN.—An important case is being tried in the Supreme Court at Halifax before Judge Ritchie. Halifax does not enforce the Dominion law regarding the storage of petroleum which is landed by the thousand barrels on wharves and stored in wooden sheds along the water front. Last year Mrs. Morley protested that her property was endangered by this practice and notified the city that she would hold them responsible for loss by fire. The city continued to permit the oil to be landed. Subsequently Mrs. Morley was burned out in the \$100,000 fire in Water street last year, which was greatly aided by the oil. She now sues the city for \$3,000 damages. If she succeeds, other suits aggregating \$70,000 will be brought.
