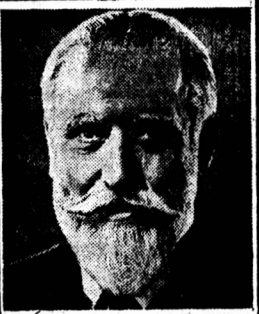

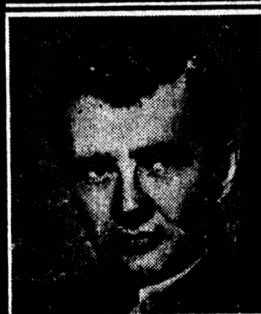

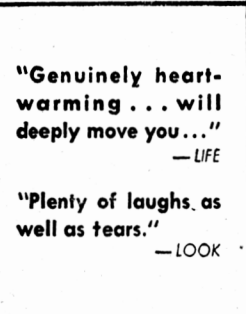

Takes Issue With Toronto Newspaper On Postal Rates

OTTAWA, June 13 - (CP) - Postmaster General Rinfret said today an increase in the mail subscription rates of the Toronto Globe and Mail is 5 1/2 times greater than what the newspaper will pay in higher postal rates under a bill adopted by the Commons.

He made the statement in the Commons after taking issue with an editorial in today's issue of the newspaper. He said the editorial charged him with distorting figures during debate on legislation providing for higher postal rates for newspapers and publications.

Mr. Rinfret repeated his figures and said that the Globe and Mail recently increased its 30,380 mail subscriptions by \$3 a year - to \$10 from \$7.

This meant mail subscriptions were increased a total of \$91,140 a year. The new legislation boosted the newspaper's postal charges \$32,886 before deduction of income tax and \$16,183 after deduction.

He said the difference between what the Globe and Mail will receive from rural subscribers and what it will pay in increased postal charges will represent a profit of \$74,957.

The increase to mail subscribers is therefore more than 5 1/2 times the increase in the postage rates, Mr. Rinfret said.

Mr. Rinfret said the editorial had referred to a letter he had read to the Commons. The letter was from the circulation manager to postmaster's and rural mail carriers.

The editorial charged Mr. Rinfret with distorting facts and figures clearly stated in the letter. He quoted the editorial as adding: "The letter did not say or suggest that the proposed new rates meant \$3.90 in extra postage. What it said was this: Under the new postal rates, announced subscription has increased \$3.90 since 1938 - and only now is part of this increased cost being passed on to our readers."

Derailed Pulpwood Cars Being Replaced

Three carloads of pulpwood became derailed and rolled over a fifteen foot embankment between Fodhla and Grand View on the Murray River railway line on Monday afternoon.

The conductor and brakeman were riding in the van immediately behind the three cars. The van became derailed but did not go over the embankment. The cars were the sixth, seventh and eighth on an extra freight coming to the City from Murray River.

One of the cars was placed back on the tracks yesterday evening and the other two are expected to be back today. It was stated last night. Two of the cars are of steel construction and the other of wood.

A C.N.R. crew under foreman Wilfred Livingstone was out early yesterday morning unloading the pulp wood. The cars are being placed back on the track by crane.

N. S. House Meets To Consider Taxes

HALIFAX, June 13 - (CP) - The Nova Scotia Legislature, faced with rising costs of government, meets today to open new sources of revenue.

Speculation yesterday was that the Liberal Government of Premier Angus L. Macdonald would propose increases in present taxes rather than direct sales tax.

Liquor, gasoline, amusement, motor vehicle and big game fees were mentioned as possible sources of increased income.

Only taxation measures are on the agenda of the House, a reopening of the 1951 adjourned session.

The Government budgeted for a \$3,000,000 deficit but hoped to wipe out \$2,000,000 of this with an indirect sales tax.

The Federal Government, however, has failed to make the necessary constitutional changes to allow for this type of levy.

The taxes were to counteract in part a predicted deficit of nearly \$3,000,000 for the current year.

Mr. Stanfield also criticized expenditure slashing proposed by the Premier. He said what Mr. Macdonald, who also is provincial treasurer, really proposed was reduction of services and an attempt to cover up past mistakes.

C.C.F. leader Russell Cunningham was in general agreement with the need for more revenue, and in the case of liquor suggested a further levy. He said there should be a 25-cent charge on each \$5 purchase, the proceeds to be used for social welfare. He also reiterated his suggestion for gypsum royalties and urged that such games as bingo - flourishing in Nova Scotia - be legalized and taxed.

He asked for easing of the regulations under which persons in the 65-69 age bracket can obtain old age pensions. Some of the regulations were too severe.

The Legislature also heard J. Smith McIvor (L-Cape Breton South) and Mr. Cunningham urge through study of the S.A. Lawrence seaway project. They warned the seaway might be disastrous for Nova Scotia, especially Cape Breton's coal and steel industries.

Death Yesterday Of Well Known Montague Man

The death occurred at the King's County Memorial Hospital on June 13th of one of Montague's oldest and most respected gentlemen, Mr. Frank Murphy in his 88th year. Lt. Gov. Prowse

In order to become nurses, he urged young girls to receive proper academic training at Prince of Wales College, "then they should teach for a couple of years before entering a hospital," he stated.
