

A MOUNTAIN OF SPUDS

This is part of the estimated 18 carloads of Sebago potatoes which were harvested this year by Fulton Sanderson and Sons, York Point. "This is the best crop of potatoes we have ever had," said Fulton Sanderson who is sitting on the spuds holding a couple of the big Sebagoes. The production of the 16 carloads is on approximately 35 acres, the Sandersons said. On one 20-acre field, they explained—the sons are Johnny and Robert—they put a ton of fertilizer last year when they grew potatoes there. This year they applied 2,400 pounds to the acre, and the results are good; you can see for yourself," he told The Guardian photographer. The pile of potatoes, about 10 feet high, are in an insulated building which is 34 feet by 100 feet. The 12 carloads of potatoes fills it to one-half its capacity. The other six carloads are in two of the Sanderson cellars.

Manager Has Grant Advice

The first step to take to qualify for a \$500 grant under the Winter House-Building Incentive Program is to the nearest National Employment Service Office.

Minister Offers 60 Per Cent Pay

Agriculture Minister Andrew MacRae will recommend to the committee from the producers for food processing plants that they ask for 60 per cent compensation on the actual crop losses they have suffered this year because of drought, he told this paper yesterday.

Mr. MacRae is meeting today a six-man committee from the producers supplying plants at Montague, Sherwood and New Amman who are seeking compensation on a formula they have not announced.

The thinking behind Mr. MacRae's suggestion of 60 per cent compensation is that this is the percentage covered under the regular system of crop insurance—these crops are not now covered by crop insurance, and the minister feels that the federal government would agree to such a proposal.

HALF FROM PROVINCE
The provincial government has to pay one-half of the costs on any such arrangement.

Mr. MacRae explained that he has written the processing plants asking for production figures by the individual growers for this year, and for amounts supplied by the same individual growers in previous years, so an accurate basis of comparison can be obtained.

Police Chief Asking Youths' Co-Operation

Police Chief Sterns Webster expressed his appreciation yesterday for the cooperation of the youth of the city the past two years of Hallowe'en celebrations and asked for the same help this year.

"We don't want to do anything to spoil the fun of the little children," the Chief said, "but we do have to protect our citizens from any possible rowdiness." Chief Webster remarked on the excellent cooperation his force had received, particularly in the past two years, from the young people of Charlottetown and said he expected the police would receive the same help this Saturday night.

He also noted the growing participation of young people in the Hallowe'en parties being given by service clubs and other organizations and highly commended the groups planning them. As the Chief stated it represents "a highly desirable trend to respectability."

NO LONGER WORRIED
Police Chief Webster stated this trend meant many people, mostly the older folks of the city, were no longer so worried at the approach of the day and were less fearful of danger to themselves and their possessions. However, he noted he would have every member of the Force on duty Saturday night with several special constables also on patrol in order to ensure both children and citizens enjoying the big party without undue danger.

He added a sharper note, though, when he stated definitely that Hallowe'en was to be celebrated on Saturday and said the Police had been told to permit no one to attempt to carry the celebrations into Sunday or Sunday night. If that were tried on the Sabbath, he said, anyone in costume or annoying householders that night would be promptly taken into custody.

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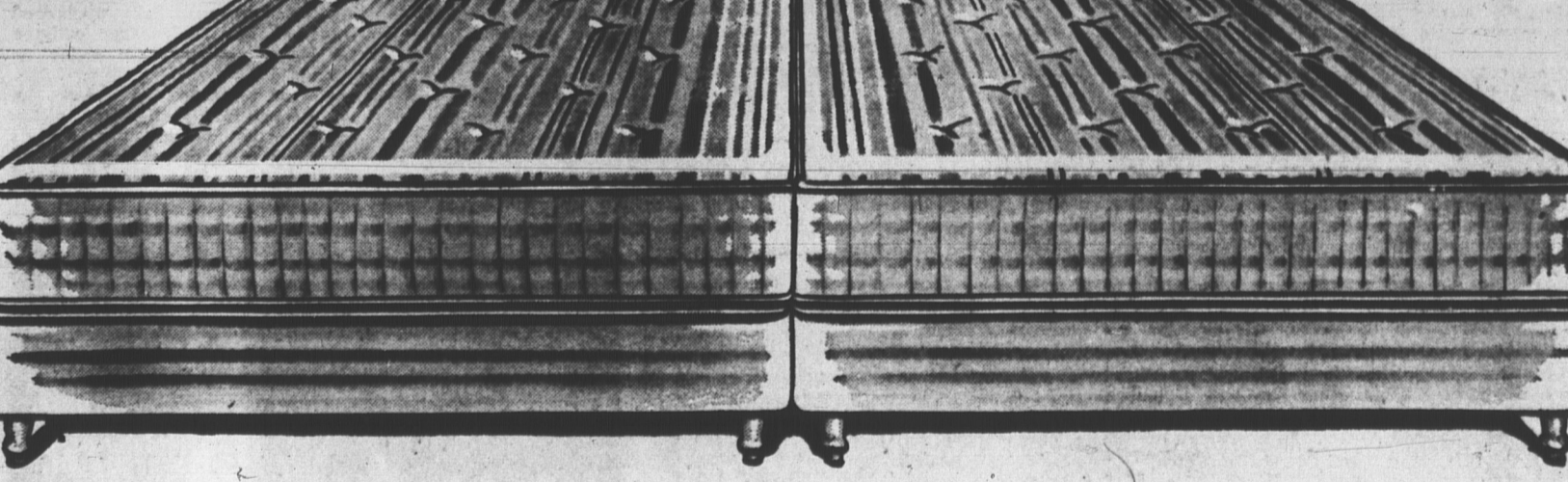
