

Cubs Beat Braves Twice; Chicago And Yanks Split

The lowly Chicago Cubs rose up and knocked Milwaukee into third place in the National League Sunday by beating the Braves twice while the New York Yankees barely escaped with an even break against the weak Washington Senators.

Billy Pierce helped the Chicago White Sox maintain their three-game lead in the American. After Pierce shut out Cleveland 1-0 in the 10-inning first game of a doubleheader, the Tribe's ace reliever, Ray Narleski, saved the second for Cleveland 4-3 with five shutout innings.

Boston took a 5-4 from Baltimore 8-0 and split fourth place in the American and Kansas City made it six in a row over Detroit on a three-hitter by Ned Garver.

REDS FATTEN LEAD
Cincinnati opened up its National League lead to two games by downing St. Louis 7-6 on an eighth inning homer by Hal Jeffcoat, the winning pitcher. Stan Musial's eighth grand slam homer lifted the Cards into a 6-6 tie in the eighth.

Brooklyn climbed past Milwaukee into second place by edging the New York Giants 5-3 with Duke Snider collecting his 1,500th major league hit, a home run in the third inning. Sandy Koufax and Clem Labine checked the Giants.

Pittsburgh ripped into Curt Simmons and his successors for 20 hits in a 13-5 romp over the Phillies in the first game of a doubleheader but Don Cardwell took charge of the second game, 1-6-3 victory for the Phillies.

Rookie Dick Drott struck out 15 Milwaukee batters, setting a club record in the 7-5 first game. Stan Musial hit two homers for the Cardinals in their losing effort at Cincinnati and George Crowe and Jeffcoat homered for the winning Reds. In an argument about a call by plate umpire Hal Dixon, the St. Louis manager, Freddie Hutchinson, was ejected in the eighth.

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Fire-works Are Expected Soon At CAHA Meeting

EDMONTON (CP)—The Canadian Amateur Hockey Association sped through a batch of minor business Sunday and cleared the way for the more controversial subjects that in the next three days are expected to bring fireworks to the floor of the annual meeting.

A major piece of business expected Sunday was the appointment of a three-man committee to start preliminary investigations into the possibilities of a proposed tour of Canada in 1958-59 by a Japanese hockey team.

One of the most contentious issues—Canada's part in the world hockey championships—was thrown open to discussion at a general session where the resolutions committee decided it was too big a topic to get any particular recommendation from committee.

The world meet discussion is expected today.

Many of the motions passed during the three-hour session Sunday were of a technical nature designed to bring up to date the working of various sections of the CAHA's regulations.

Among the more significant resolutions was one by the Manitoba branch that directs the resolutions committee to seek some plan that would increase the participation in the Allan and Memorial Cup playoffs.

The motion asks a plan to permit all branch champions to participate on even terms and that packed teams be discouraged.

A. E. Coo of the Manitoba branch said that for some time, many of the branches have had no contender in the senior and junior A series and the motion was presented to get something done to stop increasing participation.

Three motions concerning the strengthening of junior teams for Memorial Cup play were deferred for further committee study.

Two rule changes of note were approved. One would bring amateur regulations in line with the practice last year in professional leagues of allowing a player receiving a minor penalty to return to the ice if and when the opposing team scores a goal while he is off.

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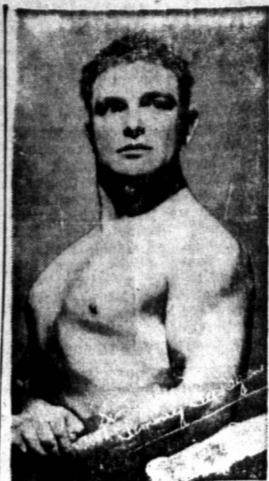
