



### UNITED INVESTORS HOLD SESSION

United Investment Services Limited held a one-day conference in Charlottetown yesterday for divisional managers in the Atlantic Provinces. Among those attending were:

### New Perth Heifers Have Good Records

Two Holstein heifers owned by J. Lincoln Dewar, New Perth have completed most satisfactory record of production tests recently.

Bargate Bonny Dale produced 15,463 pounds milk, 666 buttersfat for an average test of 4.21 percent, and unusually high breed class averages of 149 in milk and 174 fat in the three-year old class, 26-day division.

A two-year old heifer, Bargate Ra Eita, produced 12,494 pounds milk, 530 fat for an average test of 4.25 percent. This record was also made in the 26-day division and the BCAs were 132 for milk and 132 for buttersfat.

Both heifers are sired by the Benefactor bull in the AI unit. Bonny Dale is classified as Very Good and the other heifer, still too young to classify, has a conformation score that would entitle her to the same qualification as soon as she is old enough.

Bonny Dale has freshened again and produced 3,000 pounds milk in the first month having milked as much as 106 pounds in one day.

### Potato Blight Below Normal Says Bulletin

With the recent return of shower activity and periods of high relative humidity, weather conditions have been more conducive to the development of the late blight organism. As a result of the more favorable weather the disease has made its initial appearance in N. o. v. a Scotia. A trace infection has been found in a field of Bliss at Hall's Harbor and a quite noticeable infection in a field of Kennebec in the area of Glenmont.

In both Prince Edward Island and Nova Scotia late blight is much below its usual level at this date, lower temperatures this season probably retarding its progress. The present general health of the plants, however, could deteriorate very rapidly if warm, moist weather becomes common. It would be a mistake to neglect the spray program now in progress. Potato insects generally are not a serious problem at present except in some fields where aphids have become numerous.

### Slow Top Killer Advocated For Potatoes

The use of slow "top killer" on early market potatoes was advocated by the Agriculture Minister Andrew B. MacRae.

Mr. MacRae told a reporter the correct use of such a chemical could prevent the "top rotting" disease of potatoes.

He said regulations preventing the use of the top killers will likely not come into effect until next year, since most growers have already purchased their chemicals for this season.

### Three Speeders Fined In Court

A Kingston, Ont., woman, Margaret Sombkowski, was fined \$10 and costs for speeding when she appeared yesterday in traffic court.

Other speeders given similar fines were Bruce Alan Pickard, Sherwood, and Robert Bruce MacPhee, East Royalty.

Fines of \$10 and costs were also meted out to the following: Mrs. Florence Ploce, Charlottetown, failure to yield the right of way; Gordon James Ward, driving without a license, and Kenneth Augustine Callaghan, Lake Verde, permitting an unlicensed person to drive a motor vehicle.

He will be accompanied to England by his wife and two children. There he plans to continue his training, with help from the grant he won, at the Radcliffe Infirmary in Oxford.

### Tax Exemption Application Is Refused By Town Council

KENSINGTON — An application from the Royal Canadian Legion for a 10-year exemption on taxes on the proposed 490-500 legion building, was considered at the Monday night meeting of the town council, and the request was not granted in view of the town's policy that no tax exemption is granted except for an industry that employs more than 10 persons.

Town clerk Mrs. C. M. Kennedy was authorized to write the legion to this effect.

Applications were made to council for three building permits, and two were granted for additions to dwellings, by James Inglis and Earle Dunning.

The provincial department of highways is to be contacted and asked to install proper limit signs on Summerside Road, outside the town limits, leading into Kensington Road.

Other business discussed included the sewerage lift station and the town dump.

### Old Geo'town CNR Station Is Demolished

GEORGETOWN — Work commenced recently tearing down the Canadian National Railway station in Georgetown and is progressing favorably, it has been learned.

It is understood that a tender in the name of Lionel King of Georgetown was accepted for the job and that the deadline for the demolition is August 20.

The site where the station house now stands will be part of another old landmark which created the Gulf Grand Food Plaza.

It could not be learned here when the station was erected on this site but it has been before the turn of the century or in the very early 1900.

When the winter blasts piled regularly between Georgetown and Pictou, N.S., and with all the passengers coming and going from the island to the mainland during the winter months, the Georgetown CNR station was one of the busiest in the province and there employed several men.

Its demolition marks the removal of another old landmark but in contrast to other buildings that have been torn down
