PLAYED A WAR GAME.
HOW THE BIG MAN FLEECED THE SUBSTITUTE BROKERS.
The Tricky Six Footer Worked His Physical Defect to the Limit and Reaped a Rich Harvest While the Opportunity Lasted.
 During the civil war in what was then a pretty village of Michigan and has since become a city without losing any of its beauty lived a strapping six footer who looked as hard as nails, dressed well, talked smoothly and was set up like a soldier.
