## Harbor Contamination Report Ready Soon

**SUMMERSIDE** — The report on the harbor contamination survey at Summerside, conducted by the firm of J.L. Richards and Associates, Ottawa, will be available Nov. 30, J.A. Brophy town manager said yesterday.

The survey was made in an attempt to determine the various sources of contamination in the Summerside Harbor, and also to determine to what extent the contamination would be lessened should a lagoon system be constructed for the town sewage disposal.

Previous surveys here conducted by the provincial department of health have shown that some pollution in the harbour originates in the Dunk and Whitford rivers, but the survey was made to also to determine the extent of the pollution coming from the harbor.

## Legs Could Be Key To Good Golf Shot

**LONDON (CP)** — Next time you're at the 19th hole and the club bore starts talking about the secrets of long hitting, get ready to strike back.

If he says it's all in the hands and the way you hold your club, tell him to think again. It may be that the legs have it.

This revolutionary notion, shattering the patier of professional everywhere, emerges amid the first tentative findings of a scientific group trying to find out just what makes a power hitter in golf.

The experiments are taking place at a medical research centre in London's Hampstead district. The centre is a device called a Force Analysis Platform, popularly known as FAP, which records reactions on a multi-channel photographic recorder.

Three top golfers, including Dai Rees of Wales, stand on the platform driving balls into a screen. One graph records total downward force exerted by feet and body; another measures lateral horizontal force; a third registers fore-and-aft force.

Preliminary studies indicate uniformity in the swing's tempo around the point of impact, and disparities in the downswing and follow through.

### LEG STRAIGHTENS

The graph recording foot pressure shows a pronounced peak just before contact with the ball. Walter Cousin, commenting in a bulletin of the Golf Society of Great Britain, says this peak is "obviously caused" by a sudden straightening of the left leg.

Rees shows this type of peak. Cousin says, even though he

is about 30 pounds lighter than the other two swingers. From this Cousin deduces that Rees may "stamp" his foot vigorously just before impact. This may explain why he apparently builds up his downswing slowly and accelerates after impact.

## Daley Tenders Resignation

It was learned yesterday from Industry and Natural Resources Minister Leo Rossiter, that Hartley Daley, provincial resources director has submitted his resignation which will be considered by the cabinet at a future meeting.

It was pointed out by Mr. Rossiter that Mr. Daley joined the civil service on a temporary basis to get the provincial resources development program operating on a sound basis. Over the past three years, Mr. Daley organized the program, which covers community development, adult education and industrial development, extending it into all parts of the province.

Mr. Rossiter indicated that the government may move slowly on the resignation in view of the fact that one member of the resources division died suddenly this week and another member, John MacDonald, is ill.

## Ferry Traffic Up In October

Figures released yesterday by Northumberland Ferries Ltd., show that during the month of October there was a substantial increase in the movement of traffic between Wood Island and Caribou.

Passengers carried increased by 2,758 over the corresponding period in October of last year. Cars making the crossing increased by 666 and trucks by 72.

In the period running from May to October the passengers were up by 15,145 over those of the same period in 1962. Car traffic increased by 1,667 and trucks on the Wood Islands run were up by 345.

A.T. Borden, provincial director of transport, Graham Rogers, said that ferry traffic carried by the CNR ferries also showed an increase over the same month in 1962.

The ferries on the Borden Islands carried a total of 15,307 passengers during the month, with 7,983 of these travelling to the Borden Islands, and 7,324 going the other way.

This is 665 vehicles more than were carried during the same period last year.

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
