

# Canadian Marathoner Is Unable To Complete Race

LONDON (CP) — Marathoner  
Dickson Hamilton, who  
was unable to complete the six-  
mile run at White City Stadium  
Monday, did not know he was run-  
ning until 30 minutes before the  
race began.

He was asked to run as a re-  
placement for Australia's Dave  
Wheeler, winner of the event in the  
previous games at Cardiff, and  
was the first workout he had  
since he was grueling marathon run-  
ner weeks ago. At that time Dick-  
son was suffering from cramps for  
the last 12 miles, was taken to  
hospital after finishing fifth.

In Monday's race, the 26-year-  
old runner dropped out after run-  
ning three miles at the tail end  
of a field of seven.

Another short-notice runner  
was Ed Morton of Winnipeg, who  
dropped the one-mile event as a  
replacement for Aus-

# Richie Ashburn Of Phillies Takes N.L. Batting Lead

NEW YORK (AP)—Richie Ash-  
burn of Philadelphia has moved  
to the front of Willie Mays and Stan  
Musial, two other former batting  
champs, and holds a four point  
lead at the season's two-thirds  
mark of the National League.

Ashburn, who won the 1955 title  
with a .338 average, has hit safely  
in his last 10 games and boosted  
his average 11 points to .42. Mays  
collected three hits in five tries  
Monday's game against Chicago  
and the San Francisco star  
has over undisputed possession  
of second place with .338.

Musial has failed to hit safely in  
his last 10 tries. The seven-time  
league king of St. Louis slumped  
to .285 in his last week's  
games.

At Chicago and Bob

# Ferrari Denies Plans Of Retiring

MODENA, Italy (Reuters) —  
Automaker Enzo Ferrari Mon-  
day denied he plans to retire  
from racing as a result of the  
death Sunday of British driver  
Peter Collins.

Collins died from injuries suf-  
fered when his Ferrari left the  
track at close to 100 miles an  
hour during the West German  
Grand Prix. Collins was thrown  
clear but landed in a "clump" of  
grass and received multiple in-  
juries.

It was rumored Ferrari would  
withdraw from racing, but he is-  
sued a statement from his fac-  
tory here affirming his intention  
to continue to race his cars. He  
pointed out that Ferrari driver  
Mike Hawthorne leads the world  
championship tables.

Italy's Luigi Musso, another  
Ferrari driver, was killed earlier  
this summer when he crashed  
during the French Grand Prix.

Two other Ferrari drivers—  
Rugiero Castellotti and the Span-  
ish Marquis de Portago — were  
killed last year while racing.

Collins, 27, was running second  
to Britain's Tony Brooks when he  
lost control.

Commissioner Ford Frick said  
the Hall of Fame was dedi-  
cated "to the freedom loving and  
sports minded American citizen"  
and the figures who have brought  
the game to its position as the  
national pastime.

Six members of the Hall of  
Fame were on hand for the cer-  
emony—Ty Cobb, Frank Baker,  
Frank Frisch, Joe McCarthy,  
Charlie Gehringer and Joe  
Cronin.

The new Hall of Fame is an  
addition to the building opened in  
1939 when baseball celebrated its  
centennial.

# Willie Mays Breaks Out Of Batting Slump

CHICAGO (AP) — Willie Mays  
broke out of a lengthy slump Mon-  
day with three hits, including his  
first homer in more than a month,  
to lead San Francisco Giants to a  
4-1 victory over Chicago Cubs be-  
hind the effective relief pitching  
of Paul Giel.

The triumph ended a six-game  
losing streak for the second-place  
Giants in the National League  
who trail Milwaukee Braves by  
10 games.

Mays' homer, his 17th, gave  
him his first RBI in 16 games.

SALISBURY, Southern Rhode-  
sia (AP)—Witchdoctors in South-  
ern Rhodesia have found a very  
lucrative outlet for their mystic  
charms—as resident charm sup-  
pliers to African football teams.

Their fees for supplying "muti"  
(medicine) run as high as \$28 for  
a key match. But the most ex-  
travagant charms are those buried  
by witchdoctors at midnight in  
the middle of the ground before  
a cup final.

Usual charms for ordinary  
league matches are amulets  
which players wear on their arms  
and a powder rubbed on to the  
body.

Teams invariably employ one  
witchdoctor for the whole season  
—unless the team finds itself los-  
ing more matches than it feels it  
should.

# Durrelle Will Fight Holt In Africa In Nov.

SYDNEY (CP)—Yvon Durrelle,  
British Empire light heavyweight  
boxing champion, said during the  
weekend he will go to Johannes-  
burg in November for a return

the fight. A short time ago Du-  
relle scored a TKO over Holt in  
Montreal, when the South African  
was unable to come out for the  
ninth round.

In an interview Durrelle said  
again he wants to fight Archie  
Moore, world light heavyweight  
champion. Durrelle said, "most  
fighters Moore fought were  
scared. I'm not scared." Moore  
is willing to fight Durrelle but  
wants a \$100,000 guarantee.
