The October issue of the "The National Magazine" of Boston is a notable presentation of articles treating of important features of national life, interspersed with fresh and vigorous fiction. An unusually large number of fine drawings appear, and the usual departments are strong in interest.

The leading article, "The Personal Side of Speaker Henderson," by the editor, Joe Mitchell Chapple, gives pleasant glimpses of Colonel Henderson's career. "Victor Hugo in His Letters" is a thoughtful estimate of the great author's character. "Pino—a New Book Farm in the West," gives the history of a thriving colony town that forms an interesting comparison with the one established some years ago in Massachusetts. "Edwin Markham's Mission as Poet" is a brief sketch of the now famous author of "The man with the Hoe." "The American Land of Canaan," by Maitland Leroy Osborne, treats of picturesque spots in Connecticut. The last of the series of letters from Peter Mac Queen, special staff correspondent in the Philippines, gives a description of the situation that is unequalled by any other periodical. "Behind the Readlight" is a very interesting account of a ride in the engine cab of a flying express. In "Convictions" Anna Farquhar treats several timely subjects in an engaging and convincing way.

The Publisher's department as usual, is a strong symposium of current events. The annual reunion of the Grand Army at Philadelphia, and October as a hunting month also receive their share of attention. "The National Magazine" is attracting widespread attention.

Local and Other Items.

MANITOBA UNIVERSITY.—Work on Manitoba's new university building is to begin this fall.

IMPERIAL LIMITED.—It is reported that the C P R authorities will shortly discontinue running the Imperial Limited express.

QUEENSLAND VEXED.—Queensland canning factories are greatly vexed at the reports of British orders for canned meats placed in the United States, as they had been counting on supplying the forces in South Africa.

COSTLY REAL ESTATE.—The best price ever paid in Berlin for property was for a corner measuring two yards long and two wide, for which a cigar dealer a few years ago paid \$1,500, and which he sold the other day for \$12,000.

POLICE COURT.—The case against Sarah Jane Higgins for breach of Liquor Regulation Act was dismissed. A similar prosecution against Andrew Doyle was adjourned until 18th inst. Four summonses charging violations of Liquor Regulation Act were served yesterday. All are returnable on Monday.

FORTY KNOTS AN HOUR.—At the recent meeting of the British Association Sir William White, the great naval architect, expressed the opinion that a speed of forty knots an hour may yet be possible at sea. If accomplished, it will be through the agency of the Parsons' rotary engine, which is attracting very wide-spread attention at present, but speed, unless it is of commercial utility, will not be a great acquisition to the world. A very fast vessel is the torpedo boat destroyer, the Quail. She is equal to a thirty knot gait, but is rarely operated at that rate of speed on account of the damage it does to the vessel and its engines. The Quail is a mere racing shell, with space for little more than her boilers and machinery. So restricted is her capacity that she cannot carry more than ninety tons of coal, which will only serve to navigate her for 1,600 miles at full speed. To cross the Atlantic without recouping in the course of a voyage she would require to economise fuel by travelling at the rate of ten knots an hour or less. Speed that is thus obtained at the sacrifice of a ship's capacity, will offer no advantage to commerce. Only the highly specialized vessel will reach forty knots an hour, but there are many experts who believe that mail steamers will soon be operated at the rate of thirty knots.

NEWS NOTES.

The Number of Buddhists is computed to be 455,000,000.

London's General Omnibus Company runs 1,300 omnibuses, which carry 190,000,000 passengers a year and run 29,000,000 miles. It owns 15,351 horses and employs 5,000 men. The annual receipts are about \$6,000,000.

Alaska Modus Vivendi.

London, Oct. 10.—It now seems that the Alaskan controversy will probably be settled even earlier than was suggested yesterday. There is reliable authority for the statement that the finishing touches will be given to the temporary agreement at Washington within the next four days.
