

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

CANADA. OTTAWA, Jan. 7. Mr. Domville had an interview with the members of Government yesterday in relation to the Winter Port question.

At a Reform Convention held at Walford on Thursday the Hon. Alex. McKenzie ex-leader of the Reform Party bade farewell to the electors of Lambton.

Mr. Carth, of Toronto, has successfully negotiated with the Canadian Pacific Railway Co., for the purchase of their lands in Brandon and vicinity.

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 7. Magistrate Hist has received a letter asking for a description of Mrs. M. L. Dow, stock broker, and expressing the opinion that she is the woman accused of fraudulent transactions in St. John, N. B., a year ago.

GLoucester, Mass., Jan. 5. The fishing schooner "Car Lee" arrived at Pigeon Cove this afternoon, bringing in a small open boat, containing seven shipwrecked mariners, picked up at eight o'clock this morning on the eastern part of Jeffrey's bank, about forty miles east-north-east of Cape Ann.

They were kindly treated on board the Car Lee, and properly cared for on their arrival at Pigeon Cove. The names of the deceased are Charles Chaplins, Horace Small, and a man called Patrick, whose last name is not known.

EUROPEAN. LONDON, Jan. 8. The "News" understands that the British Cabinet refuses to recognize, as inconsistent with International Law in general and with the Clayton Bulwer treaty in particular, the claims of the United States to exercise entire control over the Panama Canal, and says that Lord Granville will explain to Minister West the grounds upon which this decision is based.

DUBLIN, Jan. 7. One hundred Guardsmen have been sent to counties Clare and Limerick, on the requisition of magistrates, for protection duty.

BERLIN, Jan. 8. The morning papers cautiously discuss the Imperial rescript, which is regarded as fulfilling the threat of impending conflict conveyed in recent articles in Berlin semi official organs and in Vienna political correspondence.

LONDON, Jan. 7. Earl Cowper, Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, has refused the request of the Dublin Corporation that he grant permission to Parnell and Dillon to attend at City Hall to receive certificates of the freedom of the city conferred upon them by the corporation.

BERLIN, Jan. 8. Since the Parliamentary conflict, twenty years ago, so deep and universal a sensation has never been created as by the rescript addressed to the Russian Ministry. The gravity of the situation is patent to everybody.

LONDON, Jan. 7. A meeting of the Property Defence Committee was held to-day. Samuel Morley, M. P., was present, and moved a resolution, which was adopted, in favor of the appointment of Arthur Kavanagh, as Commissioner in Ireland, to arrange for co-operation with the Irish Property Defence Association.
