INDIAN REPLY AWAITED

Pakistan Suggests UN Place Force In Kashmir

UNITED NATIONS (CP) — Pakistan called Tuesday for the replacement of Indian and Pakistani troops in Kashmir with a United Nations force pending attempts to reach a settlement in the troubled Himalayan state. Foreign Minister Z. A. Bhutto told the General Assembly such a force should consist of contingents from African, Asian and Latin-American countries and should remain in Kashmir pending the outcome of a plebiscite to determine Kashmir's future.

Mexico Hit By Hurricane

MAZATLAN, Mexico (AP) — At least six persons were dead and thousands homeless Tuesday from a weekend tropical storm that smashed into this Pacific Coast port and the northwest Mexican states of Sinaloa and Nayarit. Officials estimate the damage at \$10,000,000 from the six-hour battering by hurricane Hazel. The shrimp fleet, Mazatlan's economic base, suffered major damage, officials said. Authorities feared the death toll would rise. About 10,000 persons fled Mazatlan's low-lying slums, the hardest hit area of the city. Thousands of flimsy shacks of wood, tin and cardboard were washed away or covered by muddy waters as deep as six feet.

Florida Area Facing Tropical Storm Threat

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — Tropical storm Debbie plunged through towering Gulf of Mexico seas Tuesday toward northwest Florida and its miles of resort beaches and military bases. After giving hurricane a conspicuous South Louisiana momentary scare, unpredictable Debbie turned rapidly to the northeast. At 2 p.m. EDT, (3 p.m. ADT) the storm's centre was about 230 miles southwest of Pensacola, Fla. It was moving northeast at 10 miles an hour. Debbie's top winds were estimated at 35 to 50 miles an hour — enough to kick up high tides and foaming waves, but not in the class with Hurricane Betsy's 150-mile-an-hour winds that smashed Louisiana 20 days before. The New Orleans weather bureau said Debbie probably would reach the Florida panhandle late Tuesday night or early Wednesday.

Terrified Dogs, Cattle Gave Brief Warning

TAGAYTAY, Philippines (AP) — The Red Cross said today 184 bodies have been recovered from still-smoldering Taal volcano which erupted just before dawn Tuesday. There were no reports of new eruptions as rescue workers toiled through the ashes on the tiny island in Lake Taal where the volcano lies. They feared they would find evidence that most of the island's 2,000 inhabitants had died. Some of the islanders — awakened by the yammering of fearful dogs, cats and cattle — fled by boat before the initial explosion at 2:30 a.m. How many got away remained to be determined by a check at refugee camps hastily organized by Luzon officials and a survey of the stricken island by rescue and relief teams. The disaster developed on the 55th birthday of Philippines President Diosdado Macapagal. He flew in from Manila for a tour of inspection. But sentiment expressed in constituency resolutions suggests many favor entry into the European Common Market and a less critical attitude on Ian Smith's policies in Rhodesia. The various constituency proposals, to be offered for general acceptance by the party's annual conference at Brighton next month, are studded with condemnation of the socialist's first 11 months in office. Dief Tours Rural Area Of Quebec

LACHUTE, Que. (CP) — Progressive Conservative Leader Diefenbaker Tuesday toured the rural areas of the colorful Laurentians Mountains, saying that his ambition is to unite Canada's two founding races in "a single Canadianism." "That has been my purpose in life," he told about 75 people who turned out to meet him in St. Adolphe. He said he looked forward to "the day when a great national Confederation conference will be called... to bring about the changes necessary so Canada will have a constitution made in Canada by Canadians for Canadians."

Dief Misunderstood Quebec, Former Colleague Declares

TORONTO (CP) — John Diefenbaker misunderstood Quebec's aspirations although he wanted to be its friend, was suspicious of big business and tended to listen too much to advisers who agreed with him, a former cabinet colleague said Tuesday night. Pierre Sevigny, who quit the cabinet in 1963 over the nuclear weapons issue, outlined his opinions about Mr. Diefenbaker as prime minister on the Pierre Berton television show. Mr. Berton was interviewing the former associate defence minister about his forthcoming book, This Game of Politics. Although he is critical of the party leader in the book, Mr. Sevigny has announced he will campaign for the party in the Nov. 8 election. portfolios gone to a French-Canadian. —Mr. Diefenbaker and his colleagues did more for Quebec than had ever been done before, but he never understood that Quebec wanted a master plan and not a piecemeal approach to its problems to bring the English and French nations together for a united Canada. The cabinet crisis of 1963, when Mr. Sevigny, trade minister Hees and defence minister Harkness resigned, could have been avoided if Mr. Diefenbaker and his key lieutenants and the cabinet had had better communications. CLAIMS DIEF LONELY Mr. Sevigny said Mr. Diefenbaker was possibly too lonely a man, and it would have been better if persons who sincerely wanted to advise him had been able to reach him. Mr. Diefenbaker sought opinions but "he frequently did not like too much people who disagreed with him or told him things that he didn't like to hear. "There were some people who actually surrounded him... with flattery and if he had listened possibly less to those people and a little more to those who were more objective and to the realists the end results would have been different." One of his "most serious faults," Mr. Sevigny said, was his "holding... almost a resentment" against big business and the financial world because it stands in reason that if you get the powerful of the world behind you, the powerful of this world will influence those under them in your favor." He said at first traditionally Conservative big business thought a great deal of Mr. Diefenbaker and "most of the time they got exactly what they wanted so they really had no reason to complain." LOST SUPPORT But later an impression that Mr. Diefenbaker was against them was exploited by the opposition and "steamrolled" so that (Continued on page 3 Col. 8)

British Premier's Control Is Firm Over Conference

BLACKPOOL, England (CP) — Britain's governing Labor party received its marching orders Tuesday from a chief treading a middle way while some of the troops hung to the left and a few veered right. Prime Minister Wilson prepared the party for renewed struggles in Parliament and a possible election with a rousing reminder at the annual party conference that Labor's battle for a "new Britain" is just getting started. He rejected any idea of a formal alliance with the 10 Liberal members of Parliament in order to tighten his government's tenuous grip on parliamentary power. If Labor's two-vote majority should evaporate, he said, "it will not be an issue to be settled in the back corridors of the Palace of Westminster" but in a general election. But Wilson said he would welcome support for his foreign and domestic measures from the Liberals, who with their 10 seats in the House of Commons command a near balance of power position between Labor and the opposition Conservatives. The line-up of parties in the 630-seat House is Labor 315, Conservatives 303, Liberals 10, with two seats vacant. HEAD FOR WIDER SCOPE Wilson's 70-minute report on his government's first year in office and future plans nudged the party further away from the vanguard of the working-class toward "the whole British people."

Oak Island Treasure Lures U.S. Geologist

OAK ISLAND, N.S. (CP) — A California petroleum geologist, who read about this tiny island and its mystery-shrouded treasure troves as a boy in Colorado, has renewed the hunt for buried wealth that six weeks ago lured four men to their deaths. He said his share probably would amount to 37 per cent and total investment by the four chief participants would run off \$35,000. Mr. Dunfield was optimistic about reaching what ever is hidden beneath this 276-acre island's hard clay surface within a month. Robert R. Dunfield, 39, of Canoga Park, Calif., said in an interview Tuesday he has purchased the controlling interest in treasure rights from the widow of Robert Restall, a 59-year-old Hamilton steelworker and motorcycle acrobat whose six-year search ended in tragedy Aug. 17. Mrs. Restall, her son and daughter are to retain a small percentage. Mr. Dunfield said, but major shares in the venture are held by Jack Nethercutt of Beverly Hills, Calif., Dan Blank of Miami, Fla., G. R. Laperle of Bakersfield, Calif., and himself. "The way we are going about it we certainly should know within a month I'm convinced there is something there. What it is and who put it there I couldn't venture any opinions." Mr. Restall, a few months before he died in a gas-filled shaft, estimated the fortune to be at least \$30,000,000. But Mr. Dunfield would not "hazard a guess." He also holds no theories of his own regarding where the elegendary treasure came from and who buried it under its confounding layers of oak platforms and intricate network of drain tunnels. Movie Actor Seriously Ill

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) — Zachary Scott, 51, stage and movie actor, is "critically ill" with a brain tumor and has received radiation treatment, a family spokesman said Tuesday. The spokesman, who asked that his name not be used, said doctors described the tumor as malignant. He said Scott, who is at his mother's home here, knows of his condition. "There has been no operation," said the spokesman.

LATEST KING UNDECIDED

TORONTO (CP) — William Lyon Mackenzie King IV hasn't made up his mind yet whether to become a doctor or a politician. Two W. L. M. Kings — William the fourth's father and grandfather — were doctors. The first W. L. M. King — William's great — great uncle — was Canada's prime minister for 21 years in the period between 1921 and 1948. As he is only four days old, the latest W. L. M. King has many years in which to choose his profession. "This seems like a medical family, so he probably will continue and be the same," his mother said in hospital here Tuesday. "I'll leave that up to him, however." His father is Dr. W. L. M. King, great-nephew of the prime minister. His grandfather on the paternal side was Surgeon-Lieut. W. L. M. King, the prime minister's nephew who went down with the Canadian destroyer St. Croix in 1943. His paternal grandmother is also a doctor, Dr. Marjorie King, of Toronto.
