GORTON'S MENSTRUALS will be at the Opera House for two nights during the first week of July. To-NIGHT.—Peter Maher and George Godfrey are to meet at the Boston Casino in a ten-round "go" to-night. NAVAL.—The Blake and Tartar are in Boston, and the officers are being dined and wined on all sides. The Canada is in Halifax. ANOTHER GLEE CLUB.—The Mount Allison Glee and Athletic Club will appear in the Lyceum on Saturday next, the 2nd June. ARTISTIC.—A well-executed group of the members of the late Legislature is on exhibition in the show window of Lewis' photographic studio. FIREMEN'S TOURNAMENT.—The date's fixed for the firemen's tournament at St. John are Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, August 14th, 15th and 16th. IN AID OF THE CHURCH.—The Alberton Episcopal congregation intend having a tea on June 27th, the proceeds of which will be in aid of the funds of the new church. PROBABLY CORRECT.—The Pioneer gives currency to the rumor that the Prince Edward Island—the paper recently started in Charlottetown to safeguard the taxation bill—is controlled by Premier Peters.

NEWS NOTES. The mad king Otto of Bavaria smokes 100 cigarettes a day. It is no strange that his Det has gone back on him. The British Government has received a proposal from Germany to hold a conference on the Samoan question. Great Britain will probably accept. The South of Wales Liberal Federation has resolved to ask the government to pledge itself to pass the Welsh disestablishment bill this session or the next one. The Post proposes that England, Germany and the United States adopt an agreement by which England shall annex Tonga, Germany get Samoa and the United States take Hawaii. A new Indian 3 per cent. loan of £5,000,000 at 98 was announced on the London stock exchange on Wednesday. In the afternoon the securities were quoted at 2 per cent. premium. At Montreal an old woman who gets her living by begging and sleeps in a cellar, was brought before the police magistrate as a vagrant. Search being made \$456 was found in her wretched abode. The numerous coal operators of Central Pennsylvania have given the men till May 25 in which to return to work. If they fail to do so, the mines will be thrown open to whoever seeks employment. London, with a population of nearly 6,000,000 is governed at a cost of \$25,000,000, while in Toronto the cost of the government of New York, which is only about one-third the size of the British metropolis. Some pre-historic bones recently found at Goodland, Kansas, are supposed to be the remains of a species of peccary which lived some 5000 years ago. The bones were purchased for the Kansas State University where they will be mounted. The colored people of Ypsilanti, Mich., have withdrawn their children from school because the white children were given the front room of the schoolhouse. They may as well understand clearly that the Fool Killer utterly ignores the color line. The wonderful Chinese encyclopaedia comprising 5020 volumes. A perfect set—only one in Europe—is about to be placed in the library of the British museum. The work is very rare, and even in China there are not more than five copies of this edition. The domestic who pours kerosene oil on a lighted fire was believed to be extinct. She has reappeared in the person of Lena Bleick, a Hobart (Ind.) servant girl. No operation was given to the man after he had been exposed for hours and was drenched to the skin. Hereafter it will be illegal to employ a Canadian in any work of any municipal-ity of the State of New York, or by a contractor doing business for the State, or any city, town, village or country of the State. The United States just now seems not only to be very hard put to get work done for its people, but also very mean spirited over it. Hayti would not pass such a law. Lord Roseley, speaking at a complimentary breakfast in Birmingham on the Queen's Birthday, said the Home Rule bill contained many defects, but the Liberals would make every possible attempt to solve the difficulties. He asked the people of the nation to give to the ministry their support and encouragement in dealing with questions affecting the House of Lords. London has a feminine life and drum corps. It is made up of charming girls, who meet at one another's houses and practice under the guidance of a drum major from a Guards Regiment. What with these drummers and Miss Stokes' women volunteers, there seems to be no lack of a martial spirit in the English woman. Governor Flower has vetoed the bill to forbid the display of foreign flags on public buildings in the State of New York. The purpose of the measure was to prevent the flying of the green ensign from city halls and like edifices on St. Patrick's Day; but it will not work. In the bailiwick of New York the Yankee with his grizzled hair and small potatoes and few in the hill when Ireland is to the fore. At Toronto the Rev. Mr. Manning has been moving to strike from the Methodist Book of Discipline the foot note especially forbidding card playing, theatre-going and dancing, and his proposal was received with considerable favor by his ministerial brethren. Coming after Rev. Dr. Macdonnell's criticism of the Presbyterian Confession of Faith, this is calculated to make a deep impression on the innovating spirit that has gotten into the churches. The Chicago & Erie Railroad company is being sued for \$50,000 by a man who was recently defeated in his aspirations concerning the Republican nomination for congress in an Indiana district. The plaintiff hired a special train to carry his supporters to the convention town, but the other crowd boarded it and the conductor started off, leaving behind the faction for whose use it was intended. Of course the side that was left at home got left in the convention, which nominated the other man without opposition. As a sample of Hoosier politics this incident serves very well.

A "Tom" weeks' visit to Quebec will follow, and from his headquarters he will make a trip across the continent, visiting the Northwest and British Columbia at the time of year when these sections are to be seen at their best. Upon their return, early in November, their Excellencies will probably go to Montreal, for probably six weeks.
