ALMOND CUP CAKES

1 1/2 cups sifted Five Roses Enriched Flour
2 tsp. baking powder
1/2 tsp. salt
1/4 cup sugar

FRUITING:
1/4 cup butter
2 cups sifted icing sugar
1/4 cup milk

Sift together flour, baking powder, salt and sugar. Beat together milk, eggs and melted butter. Add wet ingredients dry ingredients and beat 1 minute. Add chopped almonds and vanilla. Beat 1 minute. Pour into greased muffin tins. Bake at 350 degrees F. 20 minutes.

For Fruiting: Cream butter, add vanilla; beat in icing sugar and milk alternately. Spread on cakes. Brown coarsely chopped almonds in oven. Sprinkle over cakes.

Thanks Received From Greece

OTTAWA (CP)—Letters of gratitude for Canadian flour that was sent last spring to earthquake victims in Greece have fattened the files of the Unitarian Service Committee here.

Dr. Lotta Hiltzmanova, USC director, has received formal thank-you letters from leaders in communities near the harbor city of Volos, where last year's earthquake left thousands homeless and destitute.

More than 250 tons of Canadian flour, purchased with funds raised by the USC's "bread for Greece" crusade, went to some 12,000 persons in the stricken areas. Along with the formal letters expressing gratitude to the Canadian people and the USC, lists of recipients in each area were also forwarded by officials of the Helene Red Cross, which distributed the flour to the Greek communities.

Shortly after the shipment from Greece arrived in Volos in March, Canada's ambassador to Greece, T. W. L. MacDermot, and other embassy officials took part in a ceremony marking the arrival of the gift.

Beauty Service For Patients

TORONTO (CP)—When she left hospital after successful cancer treatment, hairdresser Ida Sparks wondered what she could do to help other victims of the disease. The only skill in "doctoring" that she had was in building up morale by hairdressing and beauty treatments.

Now she has recruited 50 hairdressers who devote every Monday to giving free hair-do's in the cancer wards of city hospitals. A movie of their work was recently shown to the Ontario branch of the Canadian Cancer Society.

As Ida shampoos, dries and sets curls and waves she talks cheerfully to patients. Soon, they start asking for her to visit them. The medical and nursing staff make requests for Ida to go and cheer up a lonely, depressed sufferer. Sometimes, the patient has no relatives or friends to pay visits, and Ida tells the special visiting group of the Toronto branch of the society.

New Zealand Youngsters Said Flabby And Overfed

WELLINGTON, N.Z. (CP)—The idea that children in the newer countries are fitter than those in Europe has been given a rude jolt by a physical education expert. His survey shows that tough young Europeans, growing up the hard way, are far fitter than their counterparts in richer countries abroad.

The survey was prepared by D. R. Wills, superintendent of the physical education section of the New Zealand education department. He maintains that New Zealand children are too pampered, especially in their pre-school years. As a result they are soft and flabby through lack of

starting school. Also he thinks a lot of them are overfed. Europeans, on the other hand, have a harder time maintaining existence. In spite of any deficiencies in diet, their more rigorous life seems to fit them physically for the conditions they experience. The survey shows that New Zealand children rapidly catch up with Europeans in physical fitness after starting school. No figures are given for Canadians, but the returns for United States children compare even less favorably than those from New Zealand with the situation in Europe. According to Wills' figures, American children are even less fit on going to school and they are still way below standard up to the age of 16.

The standard of fitness improves in the higher schools in the United States, Wills says, and best in the universities, in contrast to New Zealand where there is a marked decline in fitness among university students. The effect of specialist exercises, games and daily physical training on the fitness of New Zealand children is clearly shown in graphs Wills has prepared. The incidence of failure in standards of fitness shows a sharp drop from six to nine, rises slightly to about 11 (the "leggy" period), and then declines steadily to 16. The moral Wills draws from the figures is that good food, fresh air and sunshine may build bony babies, but they are not everything.

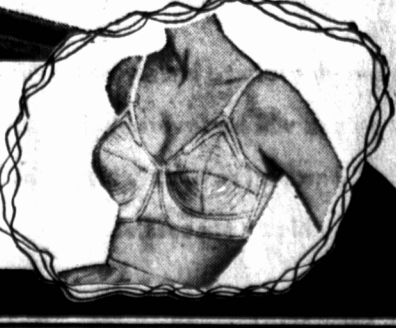
