SHIP laborers, or stevedores, appear to be a most unreasonable set of men. In St. John they are getting \$2 per day, and are to strike for 2.50, which would make their earnings at the rate of nearly \$800 per year of 312 days. In Montreal these men get from 15 to 30 cents an hour, according to their skill, and are not satisfied.

A FOUNDLING.—A plump and rosy little baby, apparently eight weeks old, was, at 9.30 o'clock last evening, found lying in the ganeway which leads to the yard of Rev. D. McNeill. It was thinly clad, and when first seen was lying on its back, on the cold ground, crying loudly. Mr. John McLean, and a lady who resides near the place, were the first to arrive on the scene, and after providing comfortable clothing for the waif, transferred it to the Police Station, where Mrs. John Hatch took it in charge. It is a promising looking child. Its mother has not yet been found, although anxiously looked for.

The steamer leaves the Ferry Wharf at noon; and returning leaves the Bridge at 6 o'clock, p. m., thus giving those who take passage a chance to witness the races at Upton Park—which is but a few chains from the Bridge.

A great number of sports will, no doubt, spend the day on the trout streams, but we think they will fall short of fish, as the trout have not yet struck in, owing to the coolness of the weather. We would, therefore, advise them to patronise the excursions or races.
