Boxing Encyclopedia Has Ring Information Galore

NEW YORK (AP)— at Fleischer has been making a comfortable living out of boxing practically all his life—without taking a punch.
As unofficial historian, compiler of facts, figures and anecdotes, prolific writer and general all-around custodian of the ring game, he is without peer.
All of which is a prelude to introducing the 16th edition of his Ring Record Book and Boxing Encyclopedia.
In addition to the records of all current fighters, past champions and near champions and the histories of the various divisions, it also contains his own all-time rankings. He rates Rocky Marciano 10th on his list of heavyweights; Ray Robinson fifth among the welterweights, and Willie Pep seventh in the featherweight class.
Here are just a few tidbits of information gleaned while thumbing through the volume willy-nilly:
Jack Dempsey received a record fee of \$5,000 plus \$5,000 expenses for refereeing a middleweight title bout in Manila in 1939. Jack Britton and Kid Lewis fought each other 20 times with only one kayo, and a fellow named Hal Bagwell had 100 consecutive fights without a defeat.
Al Cauture knocked out Ralph Walton in 10½ seconds of the first round at Lewistown, Me., in 1946, and the largest crowd ever to see a show was in Milwaukee on Aug. 18, 1941, when 135,132 spectators saw Tony Zale knock out Billy Pryor.
Joe Louis was knocked down 10 times during his career, and Willie Pep, in addition to being the youngest titleholder in 40 years, broke the receipts record for a featherweight indoors, never lost a decision, never fought a draw, and won the title 10 months after his first main event.
Georges Carpentier was the only man to campaign in all eight divisions, and Ted (Kid) Lewis fought in six classes from featherweight up. Battling Levinsky fought three main events at different locations the same day, a morning 10-rounder in Brooklyn, an afternoon 10-rounder in Manhattan, and an evening 12-rounder in Waterbury, Conn.

Briton Hopes To Be First Man To Run Across Canada

CALGARY (CP)—A wiry Briton from Hull, England, hopes to become the first man to run across Canada, possibly from Halifax to Vancouver.

Doug Hare, 26, a modest man who speaks of his ambition, is sure the 3,386-mile feat can be done in a little more than four months.
Hare, now in Calgary with his wife, has had plenty of long-distance running experience, first as a youth in England and later while he was in the British Army. He fought with the army in Korea.

SURE OF SUCCESS
"I'm positive I can run across Canada from Halifax to Vancouver," he says. "I'd need about two months of rigorous training, a sponsor and then I'd be off. But if I was going to make the run this year I'd have to start sometime in March."

Hare says he would make the journey in one of two ways. Either he would run five miles in an hour, rest a while and then trot another five miles, or he would run 30 to 40 miles straight each day and then rest for a longer period.

All he would need along the way would be a car, a driver to accompany him, a few bananas and biscuits to eat and the odd drink. The rest "is fairly easy, except for the first two or three weeks of the run."

Those first weeks is why he would like to start from the Atlantic coast. The Rockies, he says, would be easier to overcome late in the run.

Hare has been keeping himself in shape. He still takes the odd Alfa, a distance of 24 miles. When training for the Cross-Canada event, he says he would run to Chochrane and back to Calgary in a rigid schedule.

His longest run, over 136 miles, was made when he was only 18. It took him 30 hours to run from York to Scarborough to Hull and back to York in England.

In 1930 he became the first man to run 100 miles non-stop on a track at Aldershot, England. His time was about 24 hours. He has also run the 100 miles between Bath and London in 15 hours, 15 minutes.

Weighing at times between 130 and 140 pounds, he doesn't expect to lose much weight on the Halifax-Vancouver run.

Sleeping doesn't appear to be much of a problem. Hare says a runner "manages to doze while trotting along and anyway I don't

Carp Threatens Manitoba Fish

WINNIPEG (CP)—Carp is becoming a serious problem to game and commercial fish in Manitoba, says S. Sigurdson, fisheries director.
Carp not only eat the eggs and young of other fish but are also bottom feeders, and uproot the vegetation used as food by other species.
They first appeared in Manitoba about 1938, when a few were discovered in the Red River. Since then they have spread to most Manitoba lakes and rivers. There is only a limited market for carp itself. One commercial fisherman at Selkirk, Man., ships 50,000 pounds a year to the United States.

The provincial government now has undertaken a spring removal program to rid the province of the predator. Spring is chosen because at that time of year the carp form large schools, and are easily netted.

The program received an unexpected boost early in February when thousands of carp were stalled by a dam near Westbourne, Man. The fisheries department was able to net 50,000 before they moved back upstream to Lake Manitoba.

Westbourne, where the carp population suffered the sudden drop, is 80 miles northwest of Winnipeg.

FILES EARLY COMPLAINT

GEORGETOWN, Ky. (AP)—There wasn't much anyone could do for Mr. and Mrs. Joe Mulberry's baby when he began crying at a local hospital—he hadn't been born. Dr. H. G. Wells, the attending physician, said it was the first time he had heard a baby cry before birth although other cases are on record. He said the eight-pound, 13-ounce boy began crying about an hour before his birth Tuesday.

McDermott Signs With Kansas City

WEST PALM BEACH, Fla. (AP)—Pitcher Mickey McDermott signed his contract with the Kansas City Athletics Wednesday, ending his holdout and completing the A's roster.

Terms of the contract were not revealed but it was understood McDermott will receive about \$16,000.

The lefthander was obtained from the New York Yankees in the widely publicized 13-man deal.
