TURKISH BRUTALITY.

Instances Given Wherein Suffering had Resulted from Prison Abuses.

A reliable American citizen in Turkey, in a letter about the situation in Eastern Turkey received at Boston says: "There is one theme which attracts attention, namely the condition and prospects of the country. It is not only the cause of common humanity which interests us, the question now pending is whether the life or death of Oriental Christians...

The letter gives a new story concerning the state of Turkish prisoners. In the Bitlis prison there are seven cells, each one large enough for ten or twelve persons. Between twenty and thirty were crowded into each one. There are no sanitary arrangements. Armenians found in these cells have to do their own purchasing through the Zalcidias and perform their duties as they are able...

The daily allowance of bread by law should be 300 grams, but it is never more than 250, and that is dirty and poorly baked. Often it is not delivered. The water is undrinkable. Armenians often have to drink the "Khuilith" water. This is the water of the tank where the Turks perform ablutions for prayer...

Caspar Phapiou, of Avard village, Moosh, had his head and arms broken by the prison keeper with an iron stave. Miran Damadian, of Constantinople, was taken to Moosh, being beaten and ill-treated by the way. He was brought to Bitlis with his leg broken. Muggeditch Soghterian, of Bitlis, died a few days after release from prison from the effects of ill-treatment sustained in prison...

Malkhas Aghajanian and Serop Malkhassian of Azid village of Moosh, were beaten into a fainting condition. Malkhassian was burned in eight places with red-hot ramrod. He was kept standing on his feet for five days and nights without food or drink...

The oil boring operations in the northern lands are to be continued this year. Indications are promising and the day may not be distant when to the other resources of the territories will be added petroleum fields.

The Duchess of Devonshire is pretty well fixed. She is mistress of eight magnificent country seats and town houses, a chateau in France, a villa on the Riviera and has a daughter married to a man who bears three dukedoms—Hamilton, Brandon and Chateaurain. She herself has been twice led to the altar by a duke.

The London Free Press wants a statue erected to Thomas St. Paul, of 1813, which tried the staff Canadiana were made of, the Shawnee chief, Brock's ally, did a man's whole duty, and like Brock, gave up his life on the battlefield that Canada might retain her connection with the motherland. Less deserving men have had statues erected to them.

The first official crop bulletin from the Manitoba Government this year was issued on Saturday last. The estimated increase in acreage for the year is 290,380, of which 130,000 acres are in wheat. The total wheat area is placed at 1,140,276 acres; oat, 482,658; barley, 153,859. Correspondents are unanimous in their reports that the crop prospects were never brighter at this season of the year.

A heavy consignment of American and Canadian horses was sold in London, G. B., a few days ago. They were much admired and found many buyers. Twenty-six Canadian horses averaged 49 guineas each, and twenty-four Canadian horses which were landed from the steamer Carlisle City, a few days ago, were sold at the same average price. Nineteen American horses from Iowa brought an average of 28 guineas each.

According to the latest crops reports from the Northwest Territories, the acreage under cultivation this year is 295,380 more than last, and according to the recent enumeration on the population is greater by 276 than it was in 1891. It is possible that the poor old National Policy is in any way responsible for this, or is it in consequence of Mr. Laurier's declarations last summer in favor of "free trade as they have it in England" where agriculture is rapidly becoming one of the lost arts?

In a return recently laid before parliament the steady growth of the export of wheat to Manitoba within the past ten years is set forth. In 1885, 790 cars, representing 500,335 bushels, were inspected at Port Arthur by Mr. Gibbs and his assistant. In 1888 the number of cars had risen to 7,444; in 1891, 11,991 cars, and in 1894 the number was 16,708 cars, representing 10,987,773 bushels.

THE MISSING LINK.

An important meeting of the members of the Victoria Institute, Adelphi Terrace, London, took place last month. After the election of several new members—resident at home, in the Colonies, in the United States—the subject of "Early Man" was considered. In dealing with it the evidence for the existence of a "missing link" was first examined, the subject being introduced in an able paper by Prof. E. Hull, L.L.D., F.R.S., late Director General of the Geological Survey of Ireland. In dealing with it he reviewed all the known instances of so-called "missing links" including that discovered by Dr. Dubois in Java, "the skull of which, while possessing the whole of the characteristics of man, simply had a smaller brain capacity than is generally met with."

PARLIAMENT OF CANADA.

Prorogation Within Sight.

The Railway Passes Bill Voted Down.

A Sensation in the Senate.

OTTAWA, June 13.

In the House of Commons yesterday Mr. Mulock moved the second reading of his bill forbidding members travelling free on the railway to attend the session at Ottawa. There was no discussion, and the bill was voted down by 46 to 100. Supporters and opponents of the bill were before on both sides of the House.

Before adjournment Hon. Mr. Foster and Mr. Laurier had a little discussion as to the progress of public business. Mr. Laurier said there was no disposition to delay matters, and Mr. Foster said that the Government had only one small bill to bring forward in the way of new matter. The Opposition will bring up the Curran Bridge question today.

It now seems probable that prorogation will take place in the first week of July. The best information available is that the Hudson Bay Railway appropriation will not be asked for by the House this year.

The Senate has furnished a sensation in the resignation of seven out of the nine Senators who compose the divorce committee. The committee had recommended the granting of a divorce in the case of Odell, of Quebec, which was thrown out by the Senate. On tendering their resignation the seven Senators who resigned, signed a report setting forth their reasons for declining to serve. The report was a reflection on the Roman Catholic members of the Senate who being opposed to the principle of divorce were inclined to prejudice the case before the evidence was all heard. In the Odell case the husband who is applying for divorce is a Protestant, the wife a Catholic. The Senators who resigned were Kerchever, Read, Loughlan, Mackintosh, McInnes, Primrose and Dr. Ferguson.

Past Trotting in New York. NEW YORK, June 13. At Fleetwood Park, yesterday, in the 213 race, Wm. Penn's three-year-old stallion from Pennsylvania, Pa., trotted three heats over a track not fast, in 2:11, 2:12 and 2:12. This is said to be the fastest time for three heats ever known for this season of the year.
