MINER KILLED.—Michael Breen was killed in the Drummond, N. S. coal mine last week. He was struck by falling coal and instantly killed. He leaves a wife and family.

ICE AT SUMMERSIDE.—Telephonic advices from Summerside this afternoon report ice (or lolly) in that harbor as far out as the lighthouse. The Northumberland had some difficulty turning, but got out all right taking the schooner Rosemary with her. The Northumberland is expected to return there this evening.

CAUSE AND EFFECT.—For selling rum in Warren, Me., last week Wm. H. Whitney was sent to Rockland goal for sixty days. He was landed behind the bars about three o'clock and appeared very quiet during the remainder of the day, until 9.30 at night, when the other prisoners hearing a noise, gave an alarm, but before assistance reached him, Whitney fled to death. The weapon with which he had committed the deed was a small penknife. He leaves a wife, who lives at Warren.

DEVOTEDNESS OF CATHOLIC NUNS.—The heroic devotedness of Catholic nuns in ministering to the stricken in the recent outbreak of yellow fever in the South has called forth warm eulogiums from the secular press. "In these days of money-getting and place-hunting," says the Memphis Commercial Appeal, "such deeds as these re-confirm our faith in the beauty of self-sacrifice and humanity. . . . The action of these humble but earnest sisters is the shining incident of this season of misfortune and distress."

DRESSED HOGS AND PROVISIONS.—Rail receipts of dressed hogs are increasing, and winter packers are all busy here. The average weights of hogs coming in are much lighter, so far, than at the same period in former years. There seems to be any quantity of hogs in the country, as can be judged from the large receipts on the live hog market last week. Packers are quoting car lots of dressed hogs, on track, at \$5.25 to \$5.35 for heavy and light at \$5.50 to \$5.60. On the street prices for farmers' loads are steady, at \$5.80 to \$6. SLOW TORTURE.

The Horrible Death of a Negro at the Hands of a Planter.

The killing of Coot King by slow torture at the hands of William Ellis, about 20 miles from this point, is reported at Evergreen, Alabama. King was a negro, black and powerful, while Ellis is one of the leading planters of the county, a man of considerable wealth and position. He has a young daughter.

King was employed on the plantation, and, though known to be a desperate man, became quite a favorite. Soon it was observed that the young girl stood in mortal dread of him, not daring to speak in his presence, yet refusing to say anything against him.

Mr. Ellis became alarmed a few days ago over the situation. The result of his investigation was such that, calling in two or three friends, he told them that he did not want to involve his neighbors in trouble; that he was able to manage his own affairs, and all that he asked them to do was to help him to seize and tie up King, to put him on a wagon, and then to leave the scene. This was done, but not without a struggle. King declaring his innocence of offence.

With arms and legs bound he was strapped to the bottom of the wagon, which was hastily driven off to an adjacent swamp by Ellis. There, where the two men were alone, Ellis prepared for the revenge which he had resolved upon. With a shotgun he sent a charge into one of the least vital parts of the bound man, who could only writhe with pain.

After a lapse of ten or fifteen minutes he fired another load into King's body. King pleaded in vain to be killed at once. The slow torture was kept up until King's body was perforated with bullets. A final shot into King's heart despatched him. Leaving the body there for the buzzards, Ellis returned home and told his friends of what had happened. The news spreading out among the negroes, they became greatly excited and threatened to attack Ellis. They said they would not have objected to the prompt death of a man who had committed a crime such as King was accused of, but the torture inflicted was fully as bad as the alleged crime itself. The dead man has three brothers who are going around the country trying to inflame their comrades to violence.
