TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT

Summary of Proceedings.

OTTAWA, Feb. 14. The speaker took the chair at 3 p. m., and the House sat with closed doors for a considerable time discussing a question of privilege raised by Mr. Davin, who complained that a couple of evenings ago he was denied admission to that portion of the Commons' galleries reserved for Senators. The offence had been committed by Kimber, gentleman usher of the black rod. Mr. Davin claimed that, as a member of the commons, he had the right to go anywhere within the precincts, and the House sustained him in this view. The official will be warned not to repeat the offence. Mr. Charlton resumed the debate on the dual language question. He denied that the few French in the Northwest had any more right to official use of their language than had the few French in Ontario, though much had been said about the loyalty with which the French Canadians had stood by British connection, when invited to join with the thirteen states in the American Confederation. He had very grave doubts whether this was unmixt loyalty or whether it was not mixed with fear for the future of the Roman Catholic Church in the States. He thought the Northwest would settle this matter if left to them by the abolition of the French language, but it was our duty, having put this clause into the Act, to strike it out. Mr. Blake entirely dissented from Mr. Charlton's views, and said that none of the amendments met his views. He said this was a movement not only against the French in the Northwest, but to obliterate that language in all parts of the Dominion. He thought the prospect of reforms he would like to have seen in Quebec had been removed to an ircalculable distance by the agitation, and would consider the project to have absolutely vanished if this bill received any considerable support in this House. After recess Mr. Blake continued in earnest protest against anything calculated to embitter one section against another. Mr. McNeill followed in support of the bill, and Mr. Sutherland said that while he was opposed to dual language in the Northwest, he would not commit himself at present to vote for the bill. The debate was then adjourned until Monday.

British Parliament Notes.

LONDON, Feb. 14. Amid the cheers of the Opposition in the House of Commons to-day, Parnell asked what action the Government proposed to take upon the report of the special commission appointed to investigate the charges made by the London Times against the Parnellite members of the House. Right Hon. William Henry Smith stated that the report only came into the possession of the Ministers at 10 o'clock last evening, and they had not yet had time to decide upon what course they would adopt. The debate on the address in reply to the speech from the throne was resumed. Parnell moved an amendment asking the repeal of the Coercion Act, and addressed the House.

Died From a Blow.

DALLAS, Texas, Feb. 14. Jake Kilrain and a sparring troupe exhibited in the Opera House here, last night. Wm. James, of Dallas, encountered Banza, the combination light-weight, for \$25. In the fourth round, Banza hit James in the neck, knocking him limp on the stage. When the entertainment was about concluded, Muldoon announced that James was still unconscious, and called for a physician. James died at 12.30 o'clock this morning. The entire combination, including Banza, were held for murder. It is supposed that James' neck was broken.

A Defaulting Prince.

HALIFAX, Feb. 14. Society is considerably agitated over the unexpected and unannounced departure for Paris of Prince Dhuleep Singh leaving behind him an admiring host of young lady acquaintances and many creditors. His personal debts in Halifax are placed at several thousand dollars, including \$200 for board.

The Parnell Commission's Report.

LONDON, Feb. 14. There is no doubt that the report of the Parnell commission discrediting the Government as an ally of the Times will have a great effect through the country, and they think this will be a good time for the choice of a new House of Commons.

Favorable to Dissolution.

LONDON, Feb. 14. The Radical party in the House of Commons is in favor of a dissolution of Parliament, and will assist in any project looking to that end.

Toronto University Damaged.

TORONTO, Feb. 14. The Toronto University was completely gutted by fire to-night. Nothing was saved. Two men were killed by jumping from windows.

Balfour's Speech.

LONDON, Feb. 14. The Irish Presbyterian Church has issued a manifesto denouncing Balfour's recent speech in favor of Catholic endowment.

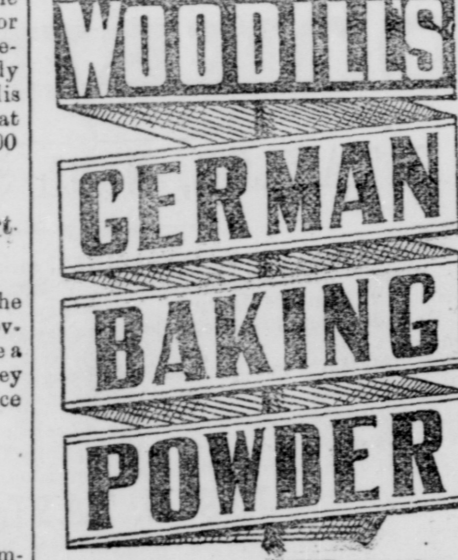
