OFF TO HALIFAX.—The Island team of athletes left by the Princess this morning for Halifax where the Maritime Championships take place tomorrow afternoon. They were accompanied by quite a number of the votaries of sport.

FINE CATTLE.—Mr. E. R. Brown sent yesterday 15 head of Guernsey cattle to the Sherbrooke exhibition. This is one of the finest herds of cattle shipped by one man in the Maritime Provinces. They will also be exhibited at the St. John and Halifax exhibitions.

THE HALIFAX BOAT.—The steamer city of Ghent arrived from Halifax last night, bringing a good general freight and a number of passengers. She left on return this forenoon, calling at Summerside en route. She had a general cargo from Charlottetown.

FIRE.—The premises of Mrs. Margaret Laughran, at Auburn, were burned to the ground on last Wednesday. Almost everything in the dwelling was destroyed. The cause of the fire is unknown, but it is supposed it was caused by a defective flue. There was no insurance. The house was almost new.

CHEESE.—The cheese board held a meeting this afternoon. The cheese boarded were 4747 colored and 500 white. The sales were: Dillon & Spillet, Hazelbrook, 200 white; Winsloe, 300 white; A. J. Biffin—Vernon River, 300 colored; Stanley Bridge, 300 colored; New Glasgow, 300 colored. All the cheese old went for 107-8c. and was last half August cheese. After the board closed some factories sold privately to Horace Hazard. They were North Wiltshire, New Dominion, St. Peter's, Hillsborough, Lakeville, Bear River and Cornwall.

MILK.—Mr. John C. McDonald has added a cream separator to his pasteurized milk plant. Besides separating, this instrument clarifies the milk. The impurities taken from the milk are to be seen at the factory. They are most disgusting to the sight and smell. About five hundred pounds (50 gallons) of milk are separated in an hour, and from the separator the clarified milk is put into the pasteurizer. The bowl within the separator revolves at the rate of 7,500 times a minute, or 125 revolutions are made each second. This enormous speed has a tendency to throw out (centrifugal force) the particles of cream from the milk, which then flow from different tubes. When the milk is being clarified only, the bowl received the impurities and no separation takes place.
