In early September when it was noticed that his usual robust health was waning his son John William arrived home from the Sunnybrook Hospital in Toronto, where he was employed, to care for him in his last illness.

The funeral services on October 12th were conducted by Mr. Louis Harris who spoke words of consolation and inspiration to the bereaved and those present from the 91st psalm. COPENHAGEN, Denmark, Oct. 19.—(Reuters) — Eight per cent of all Danish emigrants during the first nine months of this year went to Canada, the Danish Emigration Office stated yesterday. A total of 3,875 Danes emigrated, including 3,016 to Canada and 716 to the United States. Last year, 802 emigrated to Canada and 1,166 to the U. S.

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
