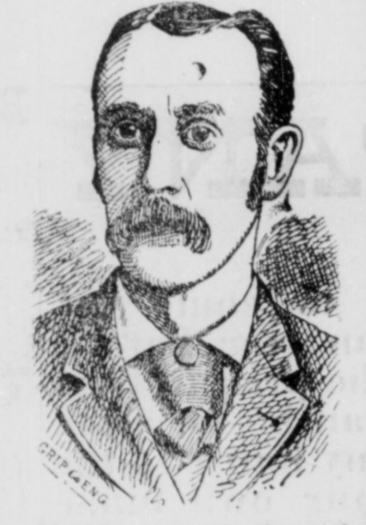

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"MINISTER OF CHARITY."

The Part Mme. Carnot Plays in Parisian Life-Her Charming Manners.

In France, constitutionally, every president is a bachelor. Mme. Carnot exists, but Mme. la Presidente is, regularly speaking, an unknown title. Mme. Carnot, says The New York Herald, is a Parisian, the daughter of M. Dupont-White, a lawyer practicing before the Council of State and the Court of Appeals and general secretary at the Ministry of Justice in 1848. M. Dupont-White is furthermore a distinguished writer whose works are found in all solid libraries. He is also remarkable as an adept in the science of political economy and is besides a witty conversationalist much sought after in society. He took special care with the intellectual culture of his daughter, and is reported in her at the same time the liberal philosophy so dear to Americans, a taste for foreign languages, Mme. Carnot speaks and writes fluently several tongues, and even this in a detail but little known-when M. Dupont-White published for the first time a French edition of a Lawyier, and incorporated in her the work of the English philosopher, a work which is in parts quite obscure.

With charming manners. To praise the wife of the Chief of State as "Mme. la Presidente" is to make one's self the echo of the unanimous opinion of all who have appeared before "Mme. Carnot," said an old Ambassador to me personally, a grandee of Spain who is a master of all questions pertaining to etiquette. "It is a lady of the first rank, a mistress of a household who has been able to keep up the old traditions in the art of receiving guests. The manner in which she receives us has much to do with the cordiality and sympathy which unite us to the Chief of State, and you may be certain that my opinion is shared by all the members of the Diplomatic Corps."

But the greatest merit of Mme. Carnot consists in her having organized at the

Elysee a kind of special ministry that one might call, if discretion was not the dominating quality of the work, the ministry of charity.

In fact, the requests for aid arrive by hundreds every day at the Elysee. After the first sorting of the applications all those that appear worthy of examination are made the object of discreet inquiry. If the result is favorable a visitor calls on the applicant, examines into her needs and relieves the most urgent of them.

It is generally the rent that must be settled in order that the family, which may be afflicted with death, sickness or the enforced idleness of its head, may be assured shelter for several months. It often happens that coal and provisions are needed immediately, and these the lady visitor procures on the spot, without delay, and sometimes clothing and bedding. In the last case, the lady visitor draws up a list of the necessary objects, which are furnished immediately at the expense of Mme. Carnot, by that very interesting work of charity which provides work as assistance to the poor Parisian families, added to and put on their feet again.

In addition to this daily system of relief Mme. Carnot institutes, every year, on New Year's Day or Christmas, a more extended plan of relief distributions, which take place under different forms.
