PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE.—The Legislature of this Province will be prorogued by His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor this afternoon at four o'clock. The guard of honor on the occasion will be under the command of Captain Longworth, No. 2 Battery, G. A., and the salute from Fort Edward will be fired by a detachment from No. 1 Battery, G. A., under command of Captain Davison.

CANADIAN APPLE TRADE.—The Toronto Globe's London correspondent says: "Mr. Woodall, of Liverpool, reviewing the Canadian apple trade for the season just closing, says the shipments were the largest on record, the receipts at Liverpool alone reaching nearly one million barrels including American. Almost during the entire period prices were higher than last year."

THEY WANT PROTECTION.—A deputation of Hebrews waited on the Mayor of Toronto a few days ago, and asked for better protection. They alleged that they were continually insulted and annoyed, and sometimes assaulted by hoodlums. They recited instances where their property had been destroyed and in one case a man's leg was broken. The Mayor has charged the Chief of Police to give the Jews the fullest measure of protection possible.

JOURNALISTIC CHANGES.—Several changes have lately taken place in the staff of the St. John Telegraph. The retirement of the business manager, Mr. Gilmor, has been followed by changes in the editorial staff. James Hannay has resigned his position as editor of the Gazette and takes the position of associate editor of the Telegraph. It is understood that Park Melville, the present associate editor, will resign his post and the suggestion is that Mr. McCready will retire from the position of editor-in-chief, Mr. Hannay taking his place. Mr. McCready is now absent in Ontario and Mr. Hannay has editorial charge.

NICE PLACE TO LIVE.—A cyclone did great damage outside the city of Kingfisher, O. T., on Monday evening last. Sixteen houses were blown down and two persons were killed.

THE FASTNET.—The steamer Fastnet arrived from Summerside with freight this morning, and will proceed to Halifax this afternoon about four o'clock with a cargo of eggs, oats, potatoes, pork, etc. The cargo will include 1000 bushels potatoes shipped at Souris.

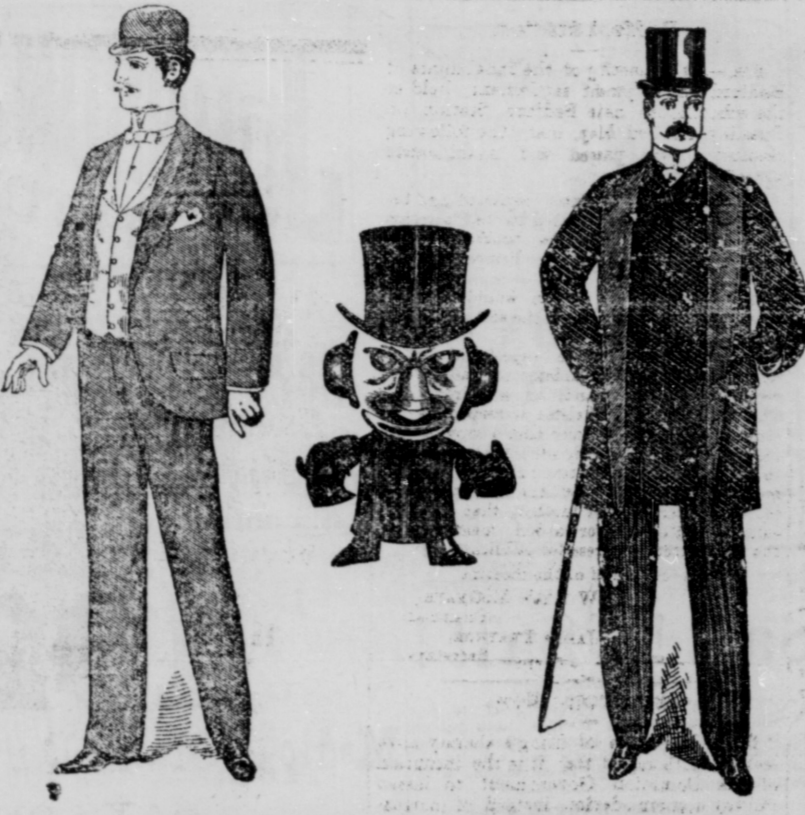
