THE steamer Miranda, Capt. Bindon, sailed for New York via Halifax early this morning, with a cargo consisting of 1,000 cases canned meats, 1,620 bags starch, 800 barrels potatoes, and sundry other merchandize.

THE exports of dairy produce for last week from the port of Montreal were 2,643 packages butter and 11,937 packages cheese, against 4,114 butter and 71,597 cheese in 1885, and 7,764 butter and 30,382 cheese in 1884.

A BARRICK despatch of the 30th ult. to the Halifax Chronicle says: A dastardly outrage was attempted in town last night. A can of gunpowder, to which was attached a lighted fuse, was thrown through the kitchen window of W. H. Watson, who has taken a leading part in liquor prosecutions lately, fortunately without exploding. His wife and four children were the only occupants of the kitchen at the time. The affair has occasioned great excitement.

COMMANDEER BOUTON, R. N., has returned to Geograpian Bay, having completed his third season's work. The steamer Bayfield, commanded by Capt. McGregor, placed at the disposal of the party by the Marine Department, has gone into winter quarters at Owen Sound. The survey will not be completed for several years. One result of the work of Captain Bouton this season was the discovery of dangerous rocks not located in the chart of Geograpian Bay prepared by Admiral Bayfield many years ago.
