

Local and Other Items.

NOVEMBER FASHIONS.—McCall's celebrated patterns and bazaar sheets for November, received to day at Beer Bros.

ALL SAINTS DAY.—This being the festival of All Saints, services were held in St. Peter's Church and in St. Dunstan's Cathedral.

BEARS AGAIN.—The St. John Sea says that bears are making havoc among the sheep near Canterbury Station, York Co., N. B.

LAST OF THE SEASON.—The steamer Miramichi is expected here Monday morning. This will, it is understood, be her last trip for the season.

WAKING UP.—Fifty Halifax stores have added plate glass fronts this summer, and the city council is looking for a site for a city market, a convenience which Halifax does not at present possess.

THE VOTERS LISTS.—Some 400 names have been added in Moncton on municipal suffrage alone to the number in town qualified to vote in Provincial elections. The total for the town now reaches 2,096.

CHEAP HORSES.—It is said that a number of broken-down horses from the ship railway were sold at auction at Amherst on Saturday for from \$1 to \$11.25 each.

THE FIRST SUCCESSFUL blood purifier ever offered to the public was Ayer's Sarsaparilla. Initiators have had their day, but some abandoned the field, while the demand for this incomparable medicine increases year by year, and was never so great as at present.

AN EXPENSIVE UMBRELLA.—A man named Thomas Gallagher stole an umbrella from a grocery store at Portsmouth, N. H., and was arraigned for so doing before a magistrate who gave him a sentence of thirty days in jail and ordered that he also pay the costs, about \$0.

ALL HALLOWEEN.—Last night the small boys, and some big ones too, got in their fine work on gates, crossings, doorsteps and other movable things, much to the annoyance and disgust of sundry staid and respectable citizens. But, so far as we know, no serious damage was done.

WELL PATRONIZED.—The Gazette says that one hundred and forty-six applications have been received by the secretary of the school trustees for permits to attend the free night schools which it is proposed to open in different parts of the city of St. John next month. Among the applicants are a goodly number of girls.

FISH BUREAU REPORTS.—Reports from Malpeque for the 29th ult., say that cod is plentiful in that vicinity when the weather permits. Cod is also reported in fair quantities along the C. B. coast from Margaree to Cheticamp. No fish have been landed at D'Esouze during the last three days owing to rough sea.

THE BEATRICE.—The steamer Princess Beatrice, Capt. A. H. Kelley, arrived from Halifax at three o'clock this morning with a general cargo, and Mr. McLaughlin as a passenger from Souris. She was detained by the stormy weather, having to "lay to" in Beaver Harbor about eighteen hours. She will sail on return this afternoon.

ISLAND PRODUCE.—The New Glasgow, N. S., Chronicle says: The schooners Lapwing, Two Sisters, and Montague, of Murray Harbor, and Lady May, of Belle Creek, P. E. I., are unloading at the bridge wharf. Their aggregate cargoes amount to 2539 bushels of potatoes, 650 bushels of oats, and 200 bushels of turnips. Potatoes average 30 cents per bushel.

HALIFAX PRICES.—The Chronicle says: The flour market is reported as unsettled, with quotations ruling at from 10 to 30 cents per barrel lower than last week. Eggs are still going up, at present selling at unusually high figures. Pork shows another reduction of 50 cents per barrel. Most grades of refined sugars have made a drop of half a cent and over per pound. Potatoes, oats and turnips have become cheaper, and factory cheese has gone up a couple of cents a pound.

He kept two days, and many friends and wives accompanied the hearse to the grave and the coffin was lowered into the earth as the process of filling in was going on. Two physicians were summoned in restoring the man to his now doing well.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

New Railway Order.

MONCTON, Oct. 31

Quite a little commotion was created in railway circles here to-day by the issue of a circular from A. Busby, General Passenger Agent of the I. C. R., forbidding all conductors to accept tickets issued by Canadian Pacific Railway agents for points between St. John and Halifax. The circular in effect states that C. P. R. agents in St. John and Halifax have been selling tickets for points along the Intercolonial, and declares this action unauthorized. It says that C. R. Barry, of Halifax, and Chubb, of St. John, have been issuing tickets for passage over the Intercolonial, and that neither the Canadian Pacific or any other railway has arrangements allowing the use of foreign tickets for business originating along the line of the Intercolonial. Baggage-masters are cautioned not to check baggage on such tickets, and conductors are informed they must not accept them on trains. The effect of this circular, as regarded here, is to stop the Canadian Pacific doing local business over the I. C. R.

On the Move.

ATHENS, Oct. 31.

The German man-of-war Kaiser, with Emperor William of Germany on board, left Piræus this afternoon. The British, German and Italian squadrons, drawn up in three lines, all fired a Royal salute as the Kaiser passed the fleets, and followed the Emperor's vessel as an escort out of the harbor. The King and Queen of Greece, the Duke of Sparta and bride, the King and Queen of Denmark, the Princess of Wales and daughters, the Empress Frederick and the Prussian Princess on board the British warship Surprise accompanied the fleets fourteen miles.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 31.

El Tank says the Emperor William's visit to Constantinople is a happy event for Turkey and shows that Germany approves the Sultan's wise policy of neutrality.

Davitt Closes His Speech.

LONDON, Oct. 31.

Michael Davitt concluded his speech before the Parnell Commission to-day. In closing he appealed to the Court to say that the Times had not proved its charges against the men who were striving to end the Anglo-Irish questions. Presiding Justice Hannan thanked Mr. Davitt for the assistance he had given the Court and complimented him upon the ability displayed in his speech. Sir Henry James began his speech in behalf of the Times. His address was of an historical character. He denied that any injustice to Ireland still existed, which justified the present attitude of the Irish Nationalists, and referred at great length to measures adopted during the last half century to improve the condition of that country.

News Notes from Halifax.

HALIFAX, Oct. 31.

Ex-Collector Ross and W. D. R. Cameron, have been appointed Arbitrators, under the Provincial Mines Arbitration Act.

The Customs receipts of Halifax for the month were \$136,000, a decrease of \$36,000.

Miss Emma Schoff, one of the most noted singers of Halifax, was married to-day in St. Stephen's Church to William C. Hackett, manager of the wholesale drug establishment of E. Elliott & Co., Toronto.

Lord Randolph's Advice.

LONDON, Oct. 31.

Lord Randolph Churchill, in a letter, urges the Conservatives the coming session of parliament, to give prominence to the land law measures, the reform of workmen's dwellings, laborers allotment, licenses and laws providing for shorter hours of labor, and dealing with the sweating system. All these questions, he says, are ripe for practical legislation.

Steamship Communication.

OTTAWA, Oct. 31.

Sir William Hynes Smith, Governor of the Leeward Islands is here to interview the Dominion Government on the question of steamship communication between those Islands and the Dominion.

The Revolution Ended.

CITY OF MEXICO, Oct. 31.

A telegram from Guatemala states that the revolution in that republic is ended, and the government has triumphed. All revolutionists taken prisoners were shot.

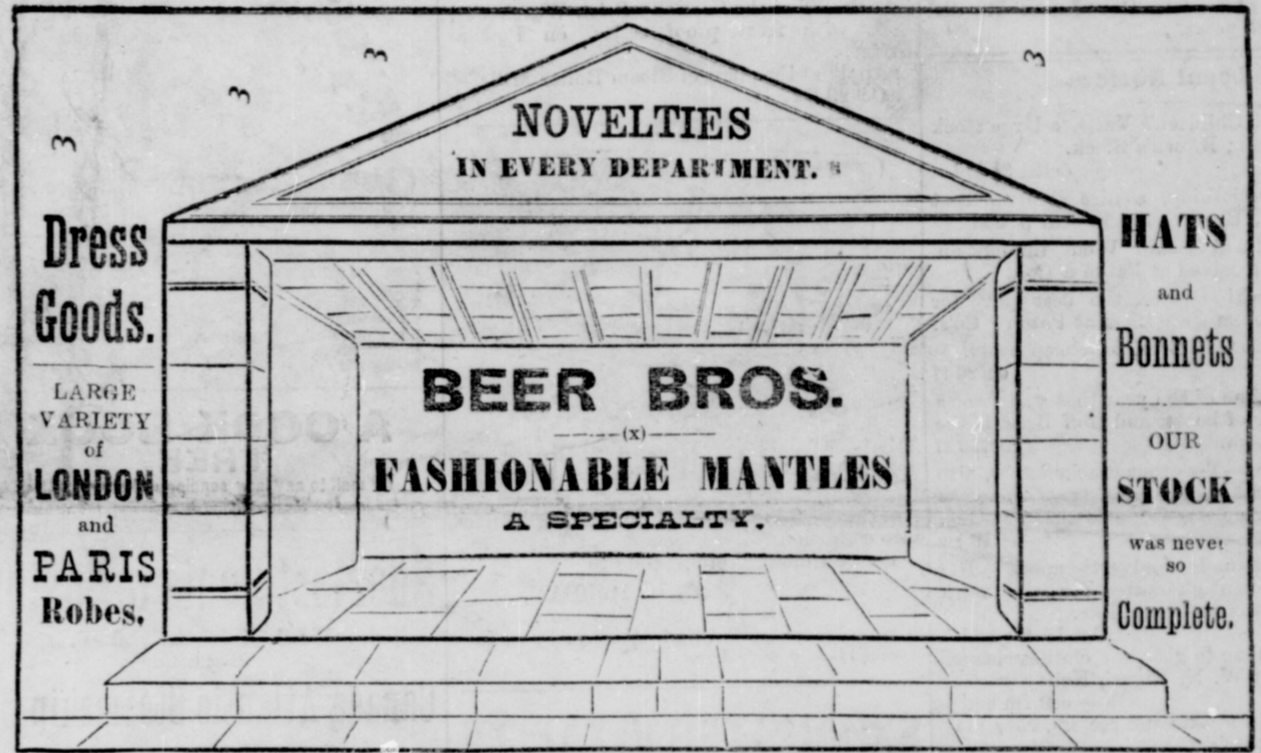
