Thoughts On The Commandments

Third of the Ten Commandments is the law against blasphemy, heart and core of which is the prohibition that we shall not take the name of God in vain.

God's power, commandments, and especially His name and the name of His Son, are not to be taken lightly. Profaning of the name of God is more than a bad habit. It is a sin against the holiness of God.

In the sermon on the Mount, Jesus sought to give men a more profound interpretation of the moral law regarding the requirements of this third commandment. Here, our Lord is not referring to oaths as inherently and necessarily wrong, for there are occasions—such as in a court of law—when the use of an oath is justified. He refers to men who use profanity or

entirely, culturally, intellectually and socially, he lags far behind them spiritually. Obsessed by possessions and status, he attributes his state of well-being to his own sweat, toil and intelligence, substituting self for God and trying to replace God's power with his own. He takes liberties with the things held sacred by his forefathers and attempts to demonstrate his independence of his Creator through irreverent use of or profaning His name.

God's name is holy and man is to reverence it above all other names. When His law is broken, man profanes what God Himself has declared sacred. Profaning the name of God is more than a bad habit. It is a sin against the holiness of God.

In the sermon on the Mount, Jesus sought to give men a more profound interpretation of the moral law regarding the requirements of this third commandment. Here, our Lord is not referring to oaths as inherently and necessarily wrong, for there are occasions—such as in a court of law—when the use of an oath is justified. He refers to men who use profanity or

handle truth carelessly and say that Jesus applied this only to the Pharisees, and that it hardly applies to modern Christians. Yet many of us are religious hypocrites, giving the Lord lip service, but refusing Him our hearts. Certainly it is much easier to keep a law which requires only the performance of certain rites, the keeping of certain holy days and the recitation of certain prayers than it is to be truly righteous in our acts, pure in our thoughts, clean of speech, with a genuine love for all mankind and desirous of helping those in distress.

Religious hypocrites pretend to know God but in their thoughts and actions they deny Him.

Thus, what is in a man's heart becomes all-important. What we are is often expressed, however covertly, in what we say. We may profess belief in God, but we do not reverence Him and His name, we break one of His sacred commandments.

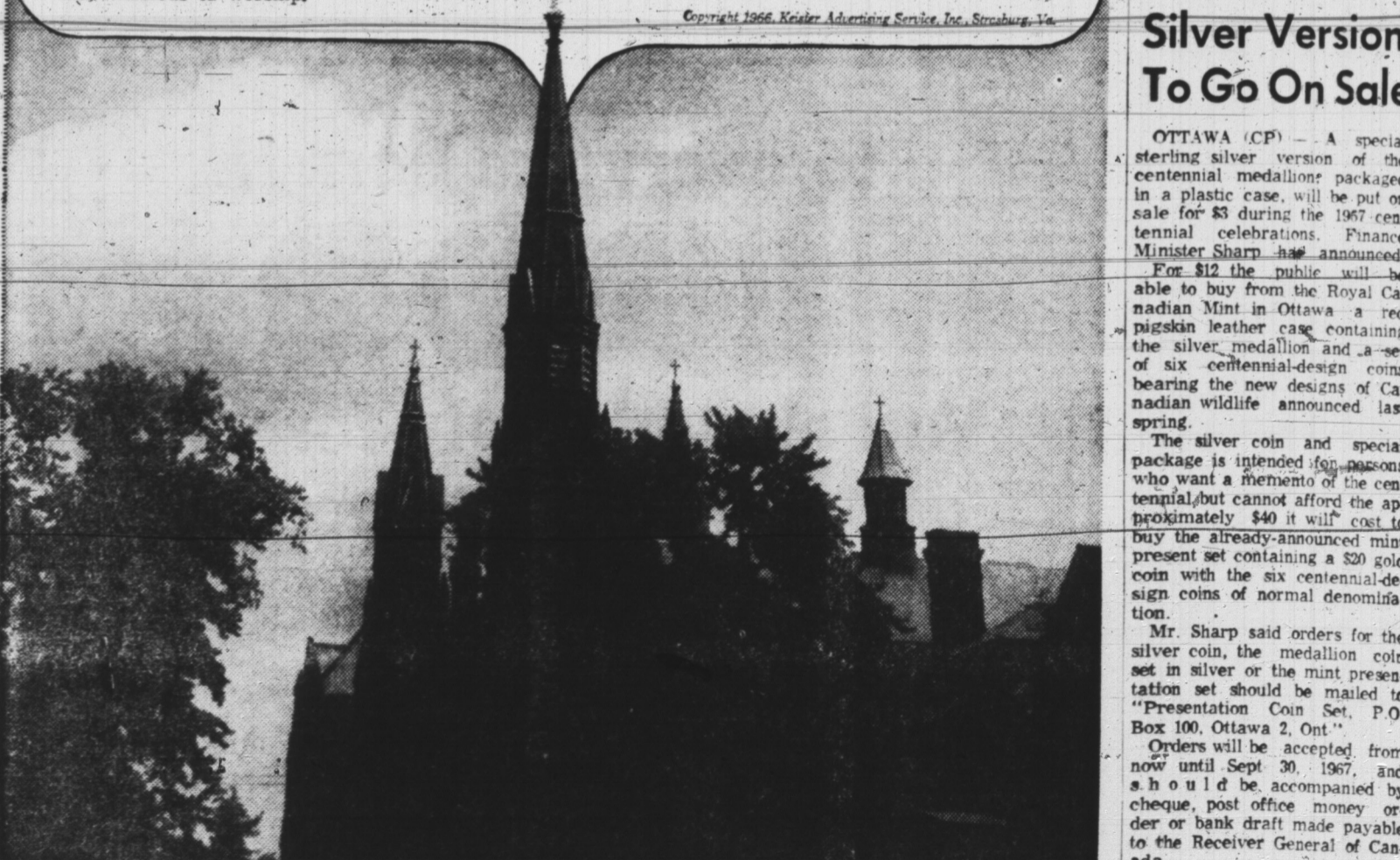
You never mistake the meaning of a Church spire.

Department Announces Appointment

OTTAWA (CP) — Commanders J. A. Charles, 48, director of Maritime forces here, will be promoted to rear-admiral and appointed deputy commander of Maritime Command and of the Pacific Fleet, the defence department has announced.

He succeeds Rear-Admiral M. G. Stirling, 51, who asked to be retired last week on grounds he could not support government policy if it leads to uniting navy, army and air forces into a single service.

The department also announced these senior appointments and promotions:

Air Vice-Marshal Frederick S. Carpenter, 51, Toronto, will succeed Maj-Gen. Cameron B. Ware, 52, as commandant of the National Defence College at Kingston, Ont., in August.

Commander Donald McClure, 50, Victoria, will be promoted to rear-admiral and appointed deputy commander operational support at Mobile Command, Montreal, succeeding Air Vice-Marshal Carpenter.

Living Costs On The Rise

WASHINGTON (AP) — Living costs in the United States rose three-tenths of one per cent last month, rounding out the biggest six months of rising prices in eight years, the labor department said.

Substantial price increases for food, medical care and mortgage interest rates were the biggest factors in the increase that boosted living costs a total of 1.7 per cent in the first half of 1966.

The rise lifted the government's consumer price index to 112.9, meaning it took \$11.29 in June to purchase typical "consumer items worth \$10 in the 1957-59 base period.

The index was 2.5 per cent higher than a year ago and up four per cent in the last two years.
